Sonja is primarily a course and subject coordinator, lecturer and tutor in Wine, Climate Change Adaptation and Animal Science at Melbourne University.

Emma has had an extensive career in dog training including handling and training her Explosives Detection Dog, Harvey (Labrador) and now training her two Dutch Shepherds, Omo in USAR (Urban Search and Rescue) and Quick Silver for Track and Search Work and Nosework. She has expertise in sensory science and human and canine olfactory systems. Sonja is currently involved in applied research in using dogs to detect grapevine (and other agricultural) pest and diseases (specifically Brettanomyces, Phylloxera and Eutypa). Determining firstly the ability of the dogs to detect the target odour and secondly to assess the reliability and thresholds for detection of that target odour.

Sonja Needs, Emma Smyth and Kerry Needs operate 'Scent Dogs Australia', conducting workshops in nosework and scentwork (tracking and scent activities).
