From then I discovered English and Gordon Setters and showed, trialled and occasionally bred them for over 20 years.

After a break from dog activities for 7 years, my daughter Claire, decided that she wanted to show a dog and decided on a Griffon. Her first Griffon was Ch Raweke Yogi Bear CD who decided that he belonged to me. After that I was hooked on Griffons and could not imagine life with out one – or several.

I trained and trialled Yogi to his CD title and now have several other Griffons that I am preparing for trialling as well as showing and sometimes breeding them under the Balliol prefix.

After owning Griffon for a few years I decided missing having the bigger dogs so I chose another hound breed Petit Basset Griffon Vendeens. I still love the Griffons though and show them alongside my PBGV's and my Pug.

Training your Griffon

Michelle Parker Brien

(This article is the first of a series of articles on training your Griffon In this edition I will look at why you need to train your dog and how to start.)

Griffons are very smart little dogs and one of the most endearing things about the breed is their devotion and willingness to please their owners.

However they do not learn like a working dog or a gundog – they cannot be trained by force or harsh methods and they do not pick things up quickly like a Borer collie would. They have their own unique learning style and if you train them in a way that best suits them you can achieve excellent results.

All dogs should be trained regardless of their size.

All dogs are pack animals and need to live as part pf a pack. They are either the pack leader or a subordinate member of the pack – there is no such thing as democracy with dogs. Although Griffons are cute, cuddly little toy dogs these basic pack instincts are still deeply ingrained in their psyche and cannot be changed.

It is essential that your Griffon is not the pack leader as it leads to a dog that is not only insecure and unhappy but also difficult to live with. This can be a problem if you treat you dog as a surrogate child. The dog can become confused and unsure of its position and this can lead to problems like separation anxiety, needless barking, a misguided desire to protect you or sometimes even biting.

For a happy, secure, pleasant companion you need to be the pack leader and train your little dog to know its place within your household hierarchy.

How to Start

When you train your Griffon you need to show it what you want it to do and gently correct it when it does the wrong thing.

In all your training you need to reward your dog with something that it really likes – that is a special treat that only happens as a training reward.

Motivating your Griffon-I prefer to use food. The food should be soft and tasty. Types of food that my dogs like are tasty cheese, cabonossi, chicken, frankfurts, ham & devon loaf etc.

You can also buy food called Chunkers at the pet section of your supermarket which they like. The important thing is that the food should be soft – not hard or crunchy as it is a distraction to them as they chew it up.

You only give them a tiny little bit of food each time as a reward – just squeeze a tiny little taste onto their tongue- it is to motivate them not provide a meal and you will need to give a lot of rewards so a tiny amount at a time is sufficient.

Timing is also important when you reward them. You only reward when they have done what you want. If they don't do what you want then you don't reward. It is as simple as that. Never reward them for doing the wrong thing or for doing nothing at all as it will only confuse them.

When you do reward you must reward within 3 seconds of the dog doing what you want - dogs have a 3 second memory so if you take too long to reward they will not know what the reward is for.

Praise- as well as the food reward you should also use verbal and physical praise simultaneously. Say good dog and pat at the same time as you give the food reward. The tone of your voice is very important – when praising it should be light and happy – a fun voice so that the dog really knows that you are pleased with it. At the same time stroke your dog under its chest or down its back. Never pat it on top of its head as little dogs find this intimidating. Always approach the dog with your hand going under the chin so that your dog can see you hand.

When your Griffon first comes home.

When you Griffon first arrives at your home remember that it is a confusing time for it so it is important not to overwhelm it. The first thing you need to do is teach it its name and this should be associated with pleasure. Use its name frequently as you stroke it. If it looks at you as you use its name, praise it and give a small food reward. Soon it will respond every time you use its name and start to come to you. This is a useful beginning for when you start teaching the recall as well.

The other problem people often have is toilet training. It is not that Griffons are difficult to train. It is just that they are so small that people sometimes miss the body language signals that they give when they wish to go to the toilet. It is much easier to notice in a dog the size of a Labrador than it is in a tiny Griffon puppy.

To toilet train - get into a routine as soon as possible. Take your dog to the same spot in your yard every time so that it will learn more quickly. Use a cue word like "toilet" or whatever you choose and repeat it frequently while the dog is sniffing around. When the dog finally obliges and goes to the toilet, repeat your cue word again and also mix it up with lots of verbal praise. As soon as the dog is finished give it a food reward and more verbal praise.

When toilet training pups you need to take them out after every meal, as soon as they wake up from a sleep and about every hour until they get the hang of it.

When introducing a new adult dog to your home it is best if you go through a similar system for at least the first week so that the dog learns the new routine in your home. Even the best behaved dogs can get a little confused when their whole life is changed so you should do everything you can to let them know what you want from the start.

What is my Dog Thinking – The essential guide to understanding pet behaviour.

By Gwen Bailey. Published by Hamlyn

This is a useful little book that is ideal for all dog owners to help them understand their dogs behaviour.

It is set out in straightforward language with lots of colour photos to illustrate the points made by the author.

It explains how to read dog body language and interprets every example of dog expression to help the owners understand just what the dog is thinking and feeling in any given situation.

It tells you why a dog is showing a particular expression and what the owners should do.

Even though I have been involved in training dogs for over 30 years and thought that I had a fairly good understanding of dog language, I still found this book to be interesting and informative.
