- There is no actual graduation test.
- Instructors will discuss graduating with handlers and dogs not ready to go into the next class level.
- Instructors welcome questions from handlers and will endeavour to assist where possible.

Training Goals – Living in the Penthouse Suite

It is important to have training goals for you and your dog. What does the view from your Penthouse look like? Is it competing in dog sports, a dog that doesn't jump on your visitors, or something else entirely?

Everyone's perfect view is different, but how we get there is the same – we take the stairs. As much as we would all love to use the express lift to get straight there, we need to take the stairs step-by-step so our dogs learn and understand each stride along the way to build their knowledge. If we skip too many stairs, learning and understanding is lost.


Here's an example – a child learns 1+1=2 but next time they sit down to do some maths, we ask them to do algebra. We've taken the express lift to the Maths Penthouse and the child is missing the necessary skills and understanding to complete the problem.

In training, we can ask our puppy to come from 1m away and we get success, but if the next time we call it from the far side of the oval, we've taken the express lift to the Penthouse again. The puppy doesn't have the understanding or skills needed to recall from such a distance.

So, instead, to build that understanding, we do lots of short recalls of 1–2m, then 2–3m, slowly building the distance and remembering that with increased distance comes added distractions that the dog needs to overcome. When we build skills incrementally, we're taking the stairs.

Sometimes we also have to go down a stair. Adding a distraction such as being out on the street is already a kind of step up, so we might need to take a step down and do lots of little, short recalls again.

Sometimes taking the stairs means that the steps forward in training are so small we don't even notice the progression. If you feel like you are "getting nowhere", stop and think

about where you were with this particular exercise 1 week ago, 1 month ago, etc? Checking in like this shows us that: yes, we are progressing – rather than thinking only about the Penthouse and feeling like we are failing because we are not there yet.

Whatever your training goals and whatever the view from your Penthouse looks like, always remember to take the stairs!

Training Reminder - Heat Policy

If on a Tuesday, the Bureau of Meteorology's weather forecast for **Wednesday is for 35°C or over, practical training is cancelled**, no matter what happens on Wednesday.

Training Reminder - Storms

There will be a post on the club Facebook page by 2.00pm on Wednesday if training is to be cancelled due to heavy rain, wind or storms.

As with the heat policy this will remain in place even if the storms pass closer to training time as it is too hard to let people know at the last minute.

Ready for class? Things to remember

We all look forward to our training days and we want everyone to get the most out of the sessions offered by BODC volunteer instructors. The following are a few things that will help ensure that everything runs smoothly and that disruptions are minimised. We only have a precious 30 minutes after all.

Footwear

For safety reasons, please ensure you are wearing sturdy, closed in footwear at all times.

• Parking

Parking behind the clubhouse is restricted to committee members and instructors. Please keep roadways clear to ensure ease of access for all using the carpark. You will need to park on the road if the carpark is full.

• Dogs are to be on lead at all times unless instructed to be off lead by an instructor

Off lead play before or after class needs to occur on the tennis courts or in the puppy pens. While your dog may be okay, it may be cause stress or over excitement for other dogs.

• Signing in prior to class

Please ensure you sign in prior to starting class each week. After your first session, you'll have a name badge. Please wear it to every session. Signing in and wearing your badge are insurance requirements.

• Watch your dog please!

Watch what your dog is doing before and after class and in between exercises. Eyeballing the dog next to them (causing the other dog to react) and marking on equipment must be avoided.

• Arrive early

If you are late the instructor can ask you to leave to keep class harmony and dogs settled.

• Yellow vest - Give Me Space

Give other members and their dogs who are wearing a yellow high-vis vest space before and after class as well as during training. Please show your respect and support for these handlers and their dogs by giving them ample space.

Mobile Phones

Don't use your phone in class! If you are expecting an important call, please inform your instructor – remove yourself from the class prior to answering. Check with the instructor prior to re-joining the class.

Remember, to get the most out of your training, practise what you learn in class each week at home! 10 minutes every day makes a difference.
