

CLUB RULES

The following Rules of the Bendigo Obedience Dog Club have been adopted for the benefit and safety of all club Members and apply to all, at all times during training, and at any function organised or participated in by the club.

- 1. Membership tags are to be worn at training at all times, it helps the instructor to get to know you and your dog's name.
- 2. All members are urged to be punctual at training sessions. Late comers will not be able to join the class unless invited by the instructor.
- 3. All dogs must be immunised. Proof of vaccination is required when joining.
- 4. Bitches in season are not permitted at training.
- 5. Dogs not permitted off lead, unless under supervision by an instructor.
- 6. All droppings are to be removed immediately by handler and placed in bins provided.
- 7. Dogs must not be left unattended in cars during hot weather.
- 8. Dogs suffering from any contagious disease or illness must not be brought to training.
- 9. No smoking while training.
- 10. Sensible footwear should be worn, thongs are not permitted in class as they are dangerous.
- 11. If you wish to use Club equipment, help put it out and away.
- 12. Should any member wish to lodge a complaint, or request clarification regarding Committee's management of club affairs and/or the conduct of the weekly training classes, such complaint or request for clarification must either be made verbally at the next general meeting, or be made in writing, to be tabled at the next General Meeting.
- 13. Ask permission to approach another member's dog and when socialising make it one on one.
- 14. Before and after class a maximum of 4 dogs running together in each of the puppy pens. Take the larger dogs to the tennis courts. Owners must be with them at all times.

MEETING DATES


Just a reminder that all BODC members are welcome to come to our regular monthly meetings and have a say on anything they would like to put forward to



Profile of the Month: Danielle & Miley

When/Where:

Miley came from a breeder in Lara (in-between Ballarat and Geelong). Leon and I found this breeder through friends who brought a dog from the same breeder. We contacted the breeder and put our names down for a female pup in their next litter. We were very excited to hear when Mindy (Miley's mum) delivered 5 healthy pups – 4 boys and 1 girl.

Tell Us More:

When it came to picking up Miley we picked up one of her brothers also – Joe. Joe is living on the farm with Leon's uncle and Miley loves going to the farm to visit her brother.

As a pup Miley was a VERY active puppy who loved playing, going for walks and runs. No matter how much exercise we gave Miley before and after work she just couldn't get enough. Leon and I decided to send Miley to Righteous Pups Community Dogs program one day a week – where Miley goes and plays / socializes with other dogs and learns lots tricks and works on her obedience skills – She just loves it and comes home so tired after being there for the day.

We also joined Bendigo Obedience Club. I was a member here previously with my last dog Zayda – an Alaskan Malamute. Zayda attended as a pup and went through all the classes and even got her CCD obedience title. It was a great club back then so I knew that's where Miley would be also attend. Miley started in puppy class and continued moving through the classes, where she is now in class 5. Miley also attends Agility and has now started Fly Ball. Miley just can't get enough of training and learning new things (probably because of her breed!!!)

Miley has become a big part of our family and usually comes to most places with us, she loves going swimming, fetching the ball, going to footy / netball and just loves being wherever Leon and I are, she even attended our wedding last October and stood up the front with our wedding party. We just love having Miley in our family, she provides us with so much joy every day, as I'm sure you all get the same enjoyment out of your four legged friends.

A Little about my experiences with sled dog racing

Weird and Wacky sports we can do with our dogs...

Dry-land sledding is an adaptation of the snow-based sled dog racing that was developed in Alaska and Canada, using dogs like huskies. Here in Australia, sledding is rarely done on snow, using wheeled scooters and rigs instead of sleds. Rather than long cross-country races, such as those commemorating the Nome Serum Run (everyone remember the movie *Balto?*), Australian races are usually around 2km per dog, with one, two and four dog teams being the most common.

It is a common misconception in Australia that Sledding is restricted to Artic and Spitz breeds, such as Siberian huskys and Alaskan Malamutes, the reality is that in Australia, many other breeds such as GSPs, Labradors and many other breeds are used in dog sled racing. To accommodate the different abilities of the different breeds, some race meets have multiple prizes – first Siberian husky team, first Malamute team – sponsored by different dog clubs in the local area. (hint hint!)



My reasons for getting into sledding were many and varied, but mainly due to suffering a family crisis many years ago. My husband was ill, and we were getting pretty down, dealing with the entire situation. In the midst of this, I saw a segment on tv about dryland sledding and I saw something that I thought we could do as a family, Not many activities welcome both dogs and children, giving us a different, more positive focus. I started walking my dogs in

front of me, rather than behind - sounds a small thing, but it led me to believe that we could do this. I had 2 English springer spaniels, Sophie and Fred. To begin with, I used seatbelt harnesses, hooked to the kids' scooter, with a homemade bungee line, that promptly fell apart. I also had what I viewed as safeguards - long leads and correction chains on the dogs. My history with trotters and horses helped and I viewed the dogs as small horses. We were off!

After that, I invested in some proper harnesses, and went off to a training day run by the Siberian husky club. At the end of the instructions, we all harnessed up, with me insisting I had to go at the back of the lineup, because my dogs went really slowly... ah... they didn't that day!



As time went on, Fred developed Arthritis, and did not handle racing well. We wanted a family pet, as well as a sledding dog. I looked at breeds that were commonly used for sledding and decided that the spitz breeds mostly run as sled dogs would not suit our family. We discussed Springers, Siberian huskies, Malamutes, Alaskan huskies, Whippets and many other breeds. But in the end, GSPs appeared on my radar — they are commonly used in Scandinavia as sled dogs. I began researching gundog breeds a bit more. I looked at GSPs, Weimaraners, Vizslas. Eventually, we ended up

rehoming a 12 month old GSP, Knusprig Layer Cake, from Christine Cunningham, of Knusprig kennels, aka Milo. We were in love!



With a GSP, you might think we'd been winning races left right and center. Not so. We continued our red lantern streak (the traditional prize for last place) for a while. In the meantime I was diagnosed with cancer and had a couple of light racing seasons, missing many races, or even if I attended, being unable to race. I'm all better now, thanks in no small part to being able to get away with my dogs and family and get away from it all! Eventually Milo and I worked things out and got our stuff in order. We don't always win, but we usually place in the top 5!

There are many things involved in Sled dog racing I am only touching on the basics here, when we first began racing we learnt some interesting things: People camp in WINTER! They like it when it's cold; a warm sunny day is frowned on!! We could not believe it, it was 5 degrees, and people were running round in shorts and tank tops. And the noise from the dogs was deafening! People spent most of their time sitting around the fires chatting. That first season, I was constantly hassling people to come for a walk with me. These days, not so much.





We used to rug up in several layers, but we have adapted, and whilst we don't wear shorts (yet) we certainly run around in t-shirts when its less than 20 degrees. The kids have learnt not to set fire to everything - that first season my kids were fanatical about getting and chopping wood, and became known as the camp pyromaniacs. Funnily enough these days that's work for them.

We learnt that over the season, the actual racing takes less than an hour, and the rest of the time is spent socializing, discussing the deep things in life (cruizers v udls) or discussing dogs and dog gear.

One of the biggest things I can say about people who do dryland sled dog racing is that they are very accepting of people and dogs. They don't care what you do, or what you have. There are people who spend heaps and have flash gear, camped next to people who have next to nothing and all are happy. There are people from all walks of life, and all are friendly and welcoming.

Introductory Agility Course

Commencing Sunday 4th August 2013.

Requirements to participate:

- Dog needs to have a reliable distracted recall as work is off-lead. Class 3 and above level is required (if in lower classes, dogs will be accepted subject to testing the recall)
- Soft collar (NO chains, gentle leaders/halties or harnesses are allowed for the safety of the dogs as they can catch on the equipment)
- Minimum age of 9 months for the dog. Dogs less than 14 months of age may be restricted in some activities due to the impact on soft bones/joints. This is to prevent injury to growing puppies.

Course Outline:

The course will introduce both dog and handler to the different equipment and is designed as a familiarisation course for both, leading to the safe (and fun) activity of Agility. Foundations of agility will be taught such as jumping, tunnels, dog walk and weave poles for the dog and handling skills with clear commands and body signals to the dog.

Course Dates/Time:

The classes will be held on Sundays at 10:30am after the obedience class, commencing 4th August to the 13th October. Classes will continue through the school holidays (if applicable) and into the next term. Due to competition commitments, classes will NOT be held on some Sundays.

Enrolment & Participation:

Class size is limited to 8 dogs & handlers. If you wish to participate, please complete the below enrolment form and return with payment of \$50 to Sarah Crocker.
