REMINDERS:

*Watch your dog please! We need to remind classes to watch what their dog is doing before classes and in between exercises. Eyeballing the dog next to them (causing the other dog to react) and marking on equipment must be avoided and remember, 2 is company, 3's a crowd with on lead greetings.

*Give Me Space: Please remember to give other members and their dogs who are wearing a yellow high-vis vest space before and after class as well as during training. Please show your respect and support for these handlers by following this as they work hard to help their dogs overcome their barriers and one negative interaction can undo weeks of hard work.

- *Dogs are to be on lead at all times unless instructed to be off lead by an instructor. Off lead play before or after class needs to occur on the tennis courts or in the puppy pens. While your dog may be okay, it may be causing stress or over excitement for other dogs or be an unnecessary distraction for people who are still working with their dogs.
- *Signing in prior to class: it is essential for insurance purposes we know who is in class. Please ensure you sign in prior to starting class each session. This also helps us keep track of people's attendance and those eligible for graduation.
- *Mobile Phones: Please refrain from using your mobile phone in class. If you are expecting an important call, please inform your instructor and if the call occurs, remove yourself from the class prior to answering. Check with the instructor prior to re-joining the class so you are aware of what is happening within the class.
- *Footwear: For safety reasons, please ensure you are wearing sturdy, closed in footwear at all times. Thongs and high heels are not appropriate and unsafe for class, and you may be asked not to take part for your own safety.
- *Parking: Please use common sense when parking. Parking behind the clubhouse is restricted to committee members and instructors. Please keep roadways clear to ensure ease of access for all using the carpark. You will need to park on the road if the carpark is full.



Yes, us humans mucked up at times with not being clear or earlier enough with giving directions to our dogs (some more than others which reflected in the results), but the dogs didn't seem to notice or care as they were having a great time.

With some beautiful runs, 3 of our members won Highest in Trial awards!!

We all came away from a great weekend of fun, learnt lots, made new friends and for everyone lots of memories, laughs and smiles.














Reflections

BODC just hosted a successful 2023 Agility Trial – and it marked 18 months since I started training agility with my kelpie Ruby.

I've always liked the concept of navigating obstacles around a course, which combines accuracy, speed, situational awareness and trust between handler and dog. Some dogs have a natural affinity with a particular sport, and working dogs such as kelpies, are often suited to agility. Ruby also happens to be a very 'switched on' (read 'does not switch off') kelpie and just thrives when tasked with 'work' and a purpose.

The Club hosted an agility training course over the 2021/22 summer, and we were hooked! As a double first-time agility partnership, Ruby and I have been teaching each other – and soaking up all the insights and wisdom shared by Meredith Marshall, James Browne and Sarah Crocker plus other instructors who have trialled agility with various dogs during their dog sport careers.

Spending time on the foundations of directional control and distance is critical, and that can feel like slow going for the first 12 months. Ruby was learning to read my body language and I was learning to give the right body indicators (actually I'm still learning that!). While you are itching to get to the 'big' obstacles like the A frame, the dog walk and the see-saw, the real skill is in the weave poles and being able to direct your dog, at speed and from a distance, with changes in direction and for them to take your choice of obstacle when there are numerous to choose from. All the basics you can do in your own backyard or local open space. You and your dog need to have drive and focus but contain the excitement levels in order to be accurate.

I joined both ANKC and NADAC in order to compete in trials. NADAC has a great entry level introduction competition, where we got experience in the ring, testing our accuracy and control, in a very supportive environment. Volunteering at NADAC trials and watching other competitors also helped to 'watch and learn' different styles of handling.

The Club hosted another agility course in early 2023, which enabled Ruby and I to further train on equipment and the right guidance from our instructors.

Finally in July this year we entered an ANKC trial – our own Bendigo agility trial. Volunteering at the trial, along with the majority of my fellow agility trainees allowed for heaps of learning – about course set up, how a trial is run and watching some of the exceptional Masters level competitors. Ruby and I had four runs (two jumping courses and two agility courses) – three with handling errors to learn from and our very first clear qualifying run!

Besides the thrill of a competition – agility has solidified my partnership with Ruby. We read each other better and have a strong level of trust in our respective abilities. It has also given me a supportive and fun group of other agility training friends, who back each other's learning journey and achievements. I'm looking forward to many more agility trials and fun times with Ruby, and our growing BODC agility community.

Trial Report - 3rd Trick Test Saturday 6 May 2023

What a fantastic effort from Club members who pulled together and had the rings in readiness for judging to commence at 8:30 am. Work at the Club commenced Friday morning collecting equipment from the various storage locations to have ready on a trailer to be taken down on the grounds next morning at sunrise. Next cab off the rank was finding the best areas of the grounds to measure and mark out the six competition rings in readiness for the erecting the ring mesh Sat morning. Friday's preparations were not finished there.

Time for some indoor preparations, check in, numbers, and to sort the 209 individual judging sheets, 209 pre-printed qualification cards, judges class judging sheets, ribbons, pens, and the rest of the paperwork that had been pre prepared during the previous week and into the judge's boxes.

Saturday's weather forecast was not very promising, so the winter wet weather gear was sourced. How lucky were we that the forecasters were very wrong with rain falling overnight Friday to freshen the grounds and a fine sunny day greeted the set-up team. What an army it turned out to be. Everyone pitching in and getting the job done. Thank you one and all, club members and friends alike. A brilliant effort.

It was so pleasing to see so many of the members who have been training since our previous test in 2022 enter their dogs. Unlike other years, some trailers too advantage of having a double test in Ballarat and a triple test in Shepparton to hone their ringcraft skills prior to our home tests.

Members who entered in Starter class were Sarah Crocker & Bolt, Sian James & Badger, Helen McCutcheon & Wilbur, Terri Rose & Tex, Terri Rose & Kenya, Dale Cousins & Coco, Amy Connor & Skeet, Bronley Taylor & Diesel, Heather Turpie and Tia, Brooke Pilkington & Marlon, Cole & Halo and Jocelyn Gan & Kiki in one class. Unfortunately, when Kiki was being judged the ring had many wasps flying around and Jocelyn wisely withdrew.

Club Novice entries were Denise Chrystal with Taylor & George, Jan Moore with Squizzy & Tilly, Sandra Price & Lexi and Brooke Pilkington & Radar.

The results were outstanding to say the least. (Q=Qualifying Score; HQS=Highest Qualifying Score)

Starter class is 6 tricks with possible score of 60 points.

- *Bolt two nice warmups and 48 Q on his third attempt.
- *Badger three Qs and Trick Starter title 57.8Q, 54.9Q & 56.5Q.
- *Wilbur two Qs-54.0Q and 56.5Q.
- *Tex three Qs, Trick Starter title, HQS Bendigo member Test A and a 2nd place 59.0Q, 57.8Q and 57.8Q.
- *Kenya three Qs, Trick Starter title, HQS Bendigo member Test B & C and a 1st place and 2nd place on a count back. 58.0Q, 59.4Q and 59.8Q.
- *Coco two Qs 56.8Q and 50.8Q.
- *Skeet three Qs and Trick Starter title 58.8Q, 55.0Q and 56.0Q.
- *Diesel competed in our first trick test in 2021 with one Q and was entered twice for two Qs and a Trick Starter title 55.5Q and 53.2Q.
- *Tia two Qs and Trick Starter Title 56.5Q and 53.8Q having qualified at Shepparton.
- *Marlon three Qs and a Trick Starter title 58.5Q, 55.6Q and 55.9Q.
- *Cole one Q 54.1Q.
- *Halo two Qs 58.1Q and 46.5Q.

Novice Class is 8 tricks with possible score of 80 points.

- *Taylor three Qs and Trick Novice title and one 2nd place 68.0Q, 71.0Q and 77.0 2nd place & Title.
- *George three Qs and Trick Novice title and two 1st places 74.Q 1st & Title, 71.0Q and 78.0 1st
- *Squizzy entered one class 72.0Q.
- *Tilly was also entered but due to a prior injury was scratched from the tests.
- *Lexi unfortunately no qualifications.
- *Radar two Qs both with scores of 59.5Q

In summary there were:

Starter Class: 13 Member entries – 26 qualifying scores – 6 titles. Novice Class: 6 Member entries - 9 qualifying scores - 2 titles. Congratulations everyone and best of luck with your future adventures.

I cannot thank the members enough for their efforts making sure the Club's first trial of the year was an outstanding success. Thank you to the judges and the Trick community for their support of the event and ensuring that the day ran smoothly. I hope you enjoyed yourself and will return in May 2024 for our next and 4th Trick Test.

Meet your committee members – and their dogs!

The BODC has been operating for 60 years and over that time many, many volunteers have contributed to supporting thousands of dogs and owners to have a more positive relationship – from instructing to helping classes, to keeping grounds maintained and helping communicate opportunities and insights. There have also been many volunteers who help the Club operate efficiently, develop new training programs and create facilities in which we can learn with our beloved canine companions.

In 2023, your volunteer committee members doing some hard yards to help all members learn new skills and enjoy time with their dogs are those listed below. Each committee member has a connection with dogs and our club. Let's learn a little about them!

Sandra, our President – owns Lexi, a 4 year old Labrador. They are currently training and trialling in scent work, tricks, rally, obedience, tracking and track & search – plus doing some conformation shows. They would like to try retrieving too. Their goal is to work through to UD level in obedience. Sandra is an instructor for scent training.

James, our Vice President, and Erica, committee member – they own Sheree and Chewie, White Swiss Shepherds, and are currently working on scent and obedience. James has been an agility judge, is a club instructor and assists with agility training.

Heather, our Secretary – owns Mali and Tia, both Welsh Corgis (Pembroke). Mali is 11 years and has retired from track & search, tracking, rally and showing. She is now doing tricks and scent work. Tia is 5 years and is competing in tracking, track & search, scent work, rally and tricks. If they can fit it in, they will do more work on obedience. Heather is an instructor for scent training.

Sarah, our new Treasurer – owns Bolt, a border collie x staffie. He has started tricks and agility. Bolt loves running up to everyone to say hello, which means Sarah's favourite activity is recall. Sarah is an instructor and also assists with agility training for members.

Clive – owns Sasha, a border collie, who is a regular at club training days. Sasha's favourite activities are general obedience and scent work – she is also a volunteer Delta therapy dog. Clive is an instructor, assists with scent training and is our general 'fix-it' handyman around the club.

Meredith – owns Macze and Isabelle who are both Murray River Retrievers. Macze is retired from agility, rally, obedience, tracking and track & search. Isabelle is doing tracking, agility, scent work and tricks. Meredith's favourite training activity is teaching the dogs to think. Meredith is an instructor in addition to instructing agility with two successful cohorts starting to compete in 2023.

Robyn (our recently retired Treasurer) & Max – own a retired German Shepherd and love obedience work. Max is a regular instructor.

Merle – owns Jesse, a Shetland sheepdog. They compete in obedience and rally. Jesse has achieved his Novice and Advanced rally titles and obedience CCD and CD titles. The training that has helped the most is focus square work. Merle is a regular instructor.

CJ – owns Mazie a Golden Retriever and Inca a Labrador. They are working on tricks, rally and obedience, and are currently very focused on retrieving trials. CJ is also an instructor.

Janice – owns Bella, a rough collie and currently focused on obedience work.

Sian – owns a border cross Badger and border collie Maggie. Sian is returning to training after a 15 year gap. They are working on tricks, agility and scent work. Their goal is to compete in obedience, agility, tricks and scent – with the ultimate goal to equal Sian's mothers' UDX title.

Denise – owns papillons (lots of them!) who do agility, tracking, rally, scent work, track & search and tricks. Denise instructs tricks and our puppy class.

Alex – owns two kelpies, Ruby and Murray. They are trialling in agility, tricks and tracking, and training in obedience, scent work and herding. Ruby has just started to trial in tracking and is advancing as a herding dog too. Murray is perfecting the art of escaping from any enclosure! Alex is an instructor and assists with agility training.

Bendigo Obedience Dog Club Rules

AMENDED BODC CLUB RULES DURING COVID-19 RESTRICTIONS



The following Rules of the Bendigo Obedience Dog Club have been adopted for the benefit and safety of all club Members and apply to everyone during training and at any function organised or participated in by the club.

- 1. Membership tags are to be worn at training, if you don't have it you need to ask for a temporary one or if it is lost purchase a new one. It helps the instructor to get to know you and your dog's name and is proof of your membership.
- 2. Please be on time for class as they are only 30 minutes long, late comers will be unable to join in.
- 3. All dogs must be immunised. Proof of vaccination is required when joining.
- 4. Bitches in season are not permitted at training until 21 days after the first sign of season.
- 5. Dogs not permitted off lead, unless under the supervision of an instructor.
- 6. All droppings are to be removed immediately by handler and placed in bins provided. Please take a plastic bag to class.
- 7. Dogs must not be left unattended in cars during hot weather
- 8. Dogs suffering from any contagious disease or illness, or who have associated with a dog suffering from a contagious disease must not be brought to the training grounds until at least three weeks after contact and/or cleared by vet.
- 9. Classes are non-smoking and mobile free. Please make sure you phone is on silent.
- 10. Sensible footwear should be worn, thongs are not permitted in class. Please avoid loose flapping clothes that will dangle near the dog.
- 11. Should any member wish to lodge a complaint, or request clarification regarding Committee's management of club affairs and/or the conduct of the weekly training classes, such complaint or request for clarification must either be made verbally at the next general meeting, or be made in writing, to be tabled at the next General Meeting.
- 12. Be aware and respect our yellow "Give Me Space" vests.
- 13. Do not approach dogs that are tethered or crated.
- 14. Instructors have the authority to request any person ignoring club rules to leave the training ground/club rooms or club event.

Just because your dog is friendly doesn't mean other dogs are, some may be nervous, reactive, fearful, in training, or owned by people who want to be left alone. Never let your dog run up to another dog.

RESPECT OTHERS AND THEIR NEED FOR SPACE.


If you have no voice control over your dog keep them on a leash.

selective dogs are normal!


