



Vale Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

As I write this, the world and more particularly the UK is in mourning for the passing of Her Majesty Elizabeth II. Out of respect we give this tribute to a famous dog lover.

Among her many other qualities Her Majesty was renown as an animal lover and particularly a dog lover. She didn't own Griffons but she was a UK Kennel Club Breeder with two prefixes. She bred her Corgis under the Windsor Prefix and she bred working Labradors under the

She is most famous for having Corgis and in this she has a connection with Australia. She got her first Corgi in 1933 when she was seven years old

The Duke of York, Elizabeth's father, approached a respected breeder named Thelma Gray who brought the family three puppies from her Rozavel kennels in Surrey to choose from. They settled on a little corgi officially called Rozavel Golden Eagle and he was called Dookie. In 1944, when she turned 18, Princess Elizabeth got Susan.

Away from the cameras, Princess Elizabeth and Susan were inseparable. When the time came to breed Susan, Her Majesty, again turned to Thelma, provider of her childhood puppies, to find Susan a mate. Rozavel Lucky Strike was the dog for the job, and founded a line of Windsor Pembroke corgis, which continued for 14 generations.

Thelma Grey later migrated to Australia and lived in Adelaide.

The Adelaide Hills Kennel Club is unique in that it holds a Royal connection directly with Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II. The February 1986 Expo Show was a world first in that a perpetual trophy was

presented for the Best of Breed Welsh Corgi Pembroke. This trophy was a personal gesture by Her Majesty in memory of the late Mrs Thelma Gray, her personal friend, who bred her first corgis. There is no other club, of any description in the world that has this very special, and unique connection with The Queen. In February 2002, then secretary, Lesley



Mackness, arranged for a number of previous Queen's Trophy winning corgis and their owners to meet Her Majesty in the grounds of Government House, an event which was covered by the press, radio and tv around the world.



The Queen also bred working Labradors and her Sandringham dogs were famous for quality and working ability. She was a keen competitor in Working Gundog trials and her dogs were frequent winners in Gundog trials

The Queen's Sandringham kennels produced 7 Labrador field trial champions over three decades. Five of these were

made up by her Gundog Trainer and later Headkeeper Bill Meldrum. Two others were owned and made up by two historic gundog handlers: Mrs J.K. Heywood-Lonsdale, the mother of The Duchess of Devonshire, and Dave Garbutt, as one of the top handlers of the modern era: he is the only person to win the IGL Retriever Championship three times with three different dogs that he bred himself.

While the duties of monarchy did not allow her time to fully train the dogs she was a hands on owner and actively planned and bred the dogs, showing a clear understanding or pedigree and working ability of the dogs.



Her Majesty also allowed her grounds at Sandringham Estate and Balmoral to be used for Pointer and Setter Trials. I recall a friend who had working Setters recounting how the Queen would wander down to watch the dogs working and chat with the competitors when she was in residence. The grounds at Sandringham were used for many years for these trials and poignantly, the last trial was held there on Thursday 8th & Friday 9th September 2022, the day of her death.

She was also aware of the dangers of breed popularity and insisted that her dogs were part of her private life. She was aware of the danger to breeds of over popularity. Her dogs were an integral part of her life for as a child and for her 70 years as a Monarch Vale.





However, one day, at the end of August, I noticed that Pomona was vomited saliva. When I checked her she had a partially engorged tick right at the base of her tail on her anus. Fortunately, I had found it in time and she only had to spend the day at the vets with the anti venom treatment.

With all the rain along the east coast of Australia, the tick season is predicted to be one of the worst.

I have never had ticks in my garden and have only used the tick treatments on a needs basis because I don't like to give strong chemicals unnecessarily.

7 signs of tick paralysis in dogs



- 1. Change in bark (sounds rapsy or quiet)
- 2. Tick or tick crater (scab left behind after the tick has fallen off) found
- 3. Vomiting, retching & gagging
- 4. Weakness in the back legs
- 5. Inability to jump or walk up the stairs
- 6. Difficulty breathing
- 7. Complete paralysis





With all paralysis ticks it is essential to get treatment instantly as the dog can deteriorate quickly. But treatment is not simple and is in several stages.

The tick poison itself, will cause paralysis of the dog's throat, making it difficult to breathe and eventually causing full body paralysis and death.

This has to be monitored by a vet carefully.

The tick anti venom serum also causes side effect and can affect the heart. It has to be administered carefully with the veterinary observation. In the case of Pomona, she did not react to the anti venom so it was able to be administered completely. In the past I had a PBGV dog who reacted quite badly to the anti

venom and it had to be administered in slow stages over two days.

It is also important to be aware that dogs affected by tick paralysis can have a relapse, either from the tick poison. The first three days after release from the vet treatment the dog must be kept quiet and clam to make sure that the heart is okay after the anti venom.

The following 2-3 weeks the dog should be kept reasonably quiet with no exercise or physical stress so that it doesn't react to the tick poison.

I have a number of possums in my yard and they are notorious for carrying ticks so it is likely that the ticks have come from them and are now finding a happy haven after the excessive 12 months of never ending rain. My dogs have now been treated with NexGuard Spectra and I have since found a small dead tick on another dog, so the NexGuard did the job My dogs will now be

Tips for avoiding tick paralysis




- in dogs
- 1. Tick search—No preventative is 100% protective, so lots of cuddles and daily tick searches are essential
- Preventatives—I recommend Advantix[™] (provided there are no cats in your home as Advantix[™] is toxic to cats), fortnightly Front-line[™] top spots, Frontline[™] spray every 3 weeks or a tick collar replaced every 2 months (remember if it gets wet it takes 24 hours before it is active again)
- 3. Be aware of the symptoms of tick poisoning & bring your dog in to the vet if they start to showing signs, if it is after hours DO NOT wait until morning! Take them to the closest 24 hour emergency veterinary hospital.
- 4. Tick search again—I cannot emphasise this enough!





There are a number of different tick treatments and I am not recommending any in particular. As much as I dislike putting chemicals on my dogs, I have no option, at least over summer. Ticks wil thrive anywhere there are warm moist conditions and anyone who lives in the areas marked on the map are advised to use a tick preventative

A NEW VET COMPASS STUDY SHOWS THAT BRACHY BREEDS ARE NOT AS HIGH A RISK OF DEATH WHEN UNDER GENERAL ANESTHETIC AS ORIGINALLY THOUGHT.



A new study reveals the true risks of anaesthesia in dogs

Published: 05 Sep 2022

A new VetCompass study, led by the Royal Veterinary College (RVC) and the University of Manchester, has revealed a relatively low risk of death from sedation and general anaesthetics for dogs in the UK. The research was carried out with the aim of generating up-to-date information to help improve shared decision-making between veterinary professionals and owners.

What is probably more surprising is the feedback obtained from Brachy Breeds. It has always been believed that the Bulldog has a higher risk of death under anaesthetic but the research has actually shown the opposite.

The team also investigated whether flat-faced 'brachycephalic' breeds were associated with higher risk. Surprisingly, longer-nosed 'dolichocephalic' breeds showed four times the odds of sedative/anaesthetic-related death compared with medium-length nose dogs, whereas no additional risk was seen in flat-faced breeds.

And

Some of the key factors associated with increased risk of sedation and anaesthetic-related death in this new study included:

- Older age
- Poorer overall health
- More urgent surgeries
- Certain breeds such as Rottweilers and West Highland White Terriers compared with mixed breeds.

"Waving a tearful goodbye to your beloved dog as they are admitted for an anaesthetic at your veterinary surgery can be one of the scariest moments of many dog-owner's lives. This new VetCompass study can help owners deal with these fears by understanding the real anaesthetic risk is not that high: 14 deaths in every 10,000 dogs. Decision-making based on the known can now replace fear of the unknown."

Dr Stephanie Shoop-Worrall, Research Fellow in Epidemiology and Data Science at the University of Manchester and lead author of the paper, said:

"VetCompass is an invaluable resource that has allowed the study of anaesthetic risks from dogs across the UK. These results can help reassure owners of the relative safety of sedation and anaesthesia in dogs, which is only getting safer over time, and can also prompt practice changes for veterinary surgeons to decrease risks further."


Professor Dave Brodbelt, Professor of Evidence based Veterinary Medicine at the RVC and coauthor of the paper, said:

"This is a timely study that updates the current estimates of anaesthetic risk in the UK. Going forward, the use of electronic patient records from resources such as VetCompass provide an excellent opportunity to monitor this infrequent but important complication seen in veterinary practice."

Socialisation

Socialising your dog does not mean taking it to parks to play with every random dog. Socialising means that your dog is calm and collected in all circumstances. A socialised dog can walk past other dogs and not be bothered, not react or behave in an uncontrolled manner. Unless the dog park is empty or has one or two dogs in it that you know well, then they can be very dangerous places for a small breed dog like a Griffon.

As well as physical danger, they can more easily pick up worms from so many dogs



defecating in a small space, be exposed to viral papilloma in the mouth, be at greater risk of contracting parvo or kennel cough from unvaccinated dogs.

Think carefully for the health and welfare of your dog before you use a dog park





An Australian who has long resided in the UK, Steven is a respected international judge with a deep knowledge of the Griffon breed. We look forward to seeing his judging.







News from Other States

Queensland

August saw the triple shows for The Griffon Club of Queensland; one Open show and two Championship shows, plus Griffons judged at Brisbane Royal.

Sadly in all cases the entries were very disappointing.

Considering the growing number of people in Queensland who have started to breed Griffons, it is very disappointing to see that they don't support the club or show the dogs they are breeding. It would appear that the majority of them are only commercial breeders, who are producing puppies to make money and supplement their income. Such an attitude is very detrimental to the breed. Dog shows are an opportunity for breeders to showcase the quality of their breeding. If they have no faith in the quality of their dogs then it is very sad that they have such a poor opinion of the dogs that they are producing.

Large numbers of sub standard dogs, bred by people who have little knowledge or care of the breed is the surest way to ruin a breed. We have seen it happen in French Bulldogs, with the breed almost destroyed by greedy puppy producers, we are seeing it in Dachshunds. I would hate to see it occur in Griffons.

The Queensland Griffon Club Shows

All three shows saw an entry of only 12-13 dogs. This club had an entry of 100 dogs for their first ever Championship show so it is very sad to see how low the numbers have fallen. The three shows saw a mixture of winners so it is good that the judges all found different things that they liked. Despite the low numbers the entry was made up of a number of dogs of very high quality.




Adelaide Royal

The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW Inc Breeders Code of Ethics and Conduct

The guidelines are as follows:

- Pre mating testing of prospective parents. Tests to be carried out if validated as a proven scientific screening method and if the evidence indicates that such testing is required in the breed due to scientific validated evidence that indicates a breed concern.
 DNA tests to be carried out if available and relevant. (Note: The only DNA tests available for for Griffons at the present time are for colour inheritance and parentage. There are NO DNA health tests available for Griffons)
- Subject to veterinary advice, no mating where tests indicate inadvisable
- Microchip puppies prior to sale
- Puppy microchip numbers to be included in the Application to Register litter.
- Presale veterinary checks on puppies with written report by veterinary surgeon if required
- Copies of parent's test results and puppy vet check results to be made available to prospective purchasers if requested
- Prospective purchasers can, prior to purchase, view puppies with mother where litter was born and raised. (This will not occur until the pups are vaccinated and protected)
- Provide detailed information on puppy care and welfare to purchasers (All relevant documentation connected with the puppy including inter alia, advice on feeding and care, registration documents, (if already issued) details of vaccinations etc are handed over to the purchaser at the time of sale. When an appropriate contract is available it should be signed by both parties. If registration documents are not available at the time of sale the breeder must comply with Dogs NSW Regulations Part 1 Register and Registration Clauses 13.9 13.11)
- To observe proper standards of management in regard to the housing, health, exercising and socialising of all dogs on the premises managed by the registered breeder. (It is strongly recommended that Accredited Breeders follow the guidelines contained in the NSW Animal Welfare Code of Practice "Breeding Dogs and Cats").
- To ensure that all pups are raised in a home environment and are treated as a member of the family. They are not kennelled outside or kept exclusively as kennelled dogs. The mother is also not a kennelled dog but is a member of the household and is treated as such.
- To keep all pups until **10-12** weeks of age and to ensure that they are socialised prior to leaving.
- To ensure that the breeder is completely honest with the puppy buyer regarding any health issues that may occur
- To ensure that the breeder provides the new owner with detailed information on maintaining the Griffons health and welfare- including information on:
 - o the dangers of overexercising in the first 12 months,
 - the dangers of allowing a pup to jump on and off furniture or run up and down stairs,
 - the dangers of early desexing
 - the need for a correct and nutritionally balanced diet to ensure that the pup grows into a strong and healthy adult

Explanation of Terms for Breeders Scheme

Pre mating testing of prospective parents.

Note: Disease testing means:

Testing for health conditions which are notified by the breed club, ANKC or Dogs NSW as relevant to the breed, and for which scientifically validated, reliable, readily available and cost effective screening procedures are available.

DNA tests for hereditary diseases that are available in the relevant breed. At the present time the most recent comprehensive health survey on the Griffon Bruxellois internationally was carried out by The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW in 2016.

This survey of over 9,000 Griffons identified the most common health issues as; Slipping Patellas, Cleft Palates and undescended testes. At the present time there are no DNA tests available for Griffon Bruxellois.

The CGBC of NSW recommends veterinary checks of all breeding dogs prior to breeding. However, we do not recommend the unnecessary use of anaesthetic to test for conditions that are rare or non- existent in the breed or if the dog does not show any symptoms.

The CGBC of NSW believes that all health testing should be done with the welfare and quality of life experienced by the dog as the prime consideration and the terms of the Accreditation: *scientifically validated, reliable, readily available and cost- effective screening procedures are available* should at all times be kept in mind

In reference to the health conditions identified by the Health Survey we have the following comments:

Cleft Palate – The majority of pups born with this condition are euthanised at birth. Some pups are able to be hand reared by breeders. Breeding not supported

Undescended Testes- This is not a life threatening condition and dogs are usually castrated and live normal healthy lives. Breeding not supported.

Patella Luxation- This condition has various grades of severity. A vet can diagnose the condition in a normal physical examination. Further testing/grading available if a condition is identified. Breeding not supported. Pups have loose ligaments that slowly tighten in the first 12 months of life. Permanent grading cannot be done until the dog is over 12 months.

Anasarca-a condition that commonly affects brachycephalic breeds. While linked to a specific phenotype there is insufficient research to indicate if it is hereditary. If the pup lives, we would expect the breeder to be guided by veterinary advice.

Inguinal/Scrotal Hernia- this can be diagnosed by a normal veterinary examination. It can be a life-threatening condition and can be hereditary. Breeding not supported

(Please note this is not to be confused with an umbilical hernia which is usually not a problem)

SM/CM – The CGBC of NSW supports the research into this condition and supports breeders who have assisted the research by getting their dogs MRI'd. We acknowledge that at the present it is still very much in the research stage. This procedure so far does not meet with any of the definitions for testing at the present time as it is not yet *scientifically validated, reliable, readily available* or *a cost effective screening procedure(s)*.

MRI's are still a diagnostic process, not a screening process and a permanent grade for a Griffon cannot be issued until the dog is 3.5 years or over.

There are guidelines for breeding published by Claire Rushbridge (UK) which the club recommends members follow as far as is possible but at the present stage it is not essential that members MRI their dogs in order to be accredited as this is still in the research phase.

However, we do recommend that breeders are fully familiar with the genetic lines behind their dogs and take all precautions, including diagnosis, to ensure that they do not breed dogs with this condition.

Other Conditions:

Hips: There is limited evidence that a condition such as H.D is a major issue in the breed in this country.

The club recommends hip X rays with formal, recognized grading if the breeder, after veterinary consultation, feels it is necessary.

The club does not recognize any diagnosis carried out by a vet which is not formally graded under the approved CHEDS grading scheme.

Eyes. We recommend that the eyes are checked during the usual annual veterinary examination. If symptoms of an eye problem are identified by the vet then we recommend a visit to a canine ophthalmologist but do not consider it necessary if the dog does not display symptoms. **Stenotic Nares**. In a limited number of cases we are aware that Griffons have been born with Stenotic Nares. Whilst it is possible that these dogs can have the nostrils enlarged to enable them to breathe we do not support the breeding from affected animals and members who have done so would not be accredited.

Equally we do not support breeding from Griffons who have required surgery for elongated soft palates or narrowed tracheas if these issues are diagnosed as hereditary.

Presale veterinary checks on puppies with written report by veterinary surgeon Copies of parents test results and puppy vet check results to be made available to prospective purchasers

Puppies are vaccinated and checked by a vet at 6-8 weeks of age.

Accredited breeders keep the pups until 10 -12 weeks when they are again vaccinated and vet checked. These check-ups can be considered as a pre- sale vet check. It is not necessary to have an additional vet check prior to sale.

The normal veterinary certificate is sufficient if the pup is healthy and free of health problems. However, if the pup is diagnosed with a health problem the CGBC of NSW expects that breeders will fully inform the prospective purchaser prior to sale.

The CGBC of NSW believes that our member breeders have the love of the breed and the welfare of the breed as their number one priority.

Buyers Rights and Responsibilities

- The majority of breeders do not ask for a deposit. However if a breeder requires one-NEVER pay
 a deposit until after the puppies have been born or there is a puppy available or you have visited
 the litter. Deposits are refundable under Australian Consumer Law unless you change your
 mind. The dam may not conceive or there might not be enough puppies born. Alternatively, your
 circumstances might unexpectedly change because of ill health, a work transfer or other
 unexpected event.
- If you buy a puppy with purchase conditions about future breeding or showing called "breeder's terms", make sure these are spelled out in a written contract, which both breeder and buyer sign and retain respective copies of. Be clear about the conditions and contact The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW if you are concerned or do not quite understand the terminology. This will avoid disagreements later. The breeder should explain every aspect of the agreement.
- You should view the Certificate of Registration and Pedigree for both the dam and sire before paying for the pup. The registration should be ANKC and the pups will be Limited or Main register. See further information -Choosing a Breeder.

If there is a problem - a consumer's right to a remedy

- If you have purchased a pet and something goes wrong, you may have rights against the seller if they failed to meet one or more of the consumer guarantees. Many breeders will sell with a written contract that detail this. Please read carefully and contact The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW if you are unsure
- Generally, you are not entitled to a remedy if you change your mind about a purchase or if the problem is due to something beyond the seller's control. However, if the seller provided an 'express' warranty or an additional promise about the quality, condition, performance or characteristics of the item purchased, they must uphold that guarantee.

• Your entitled remedy will depend on the issue and whether the problem can be classified as major or minor. Effectively, a major problem is when you wouldn't have bought the pet if you had known the nature and extent of the problem prior to purchase; for example, an animal has a terminal or serious health issue.

In this case, the consumer has the right to choose which remedy the seller will provide. This will either be to:

- have the problem with your pet corrected for example, with veterinary
- treatment and/or medication;
- return your pet to the seller and have it replaced with another one; or
- return your pet to the seller and have your money refunded.
- When the problem is minor, the seller can choose which remedy they will provide.
- It is recommended that you attempt to negotiate an outcome that both you and the seller can agree to.

If there continues to be a disagreement, Consumer Protection can provide advice and help you resolve the dispute.

(Note: it is the buyer/consumer who has the right to choose which remedy – such as a refund - if there is a problem with the health of a puppy).

It has come to our attention that some breeders may be falsely asserting their involvement with our club. Please contact us directly to check any breeders involvement with us.
