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

A reminder to members that renewals will be due at the end of June. Our club needs your membership to survive in order to protect and promote our wonderful little dogs.





## Gold show

The Gold Show is the show that features the Kerry Taylor Memorial Trophy for Best in Show. The Judge for this show was Mr John Nichols who we asked to critique the dogs for us. We thank him for his thoughtful and detailed evaluation of the dogs.

#### Critique

Thank you for asking me to judge your Gold Show. It was a pleasure to be part of a show where everyone was having a great time and in such a friendly atmosphere.

Overall, the quality of the exhibits was very good and I managed to find many quality dogs to place. There were only a few which I call off type. They did not have the required short nose and layback

which is unique to the Griffon. The layback tips the nose up and back, high between the eyes giving the deep stop and pert expression.

#### Dogs

Baby Puppy Dog- 1<sup>st</sup> 1. Kango Siso Maverick Prince B/T smooth coat of good type. Square, Cobby with level top line and correct tail set. Head correct for his age with good turnup and layback. Lips fitting neatly. Movement true albeit a little uncontrolled with enthusiasm. Baby in Show



Puppy Dog- 1st 2. Shigriff Sounds like a Plan.



full of quality. Square compact, level top line, correct tail set. Excellent head, nose deep set, nestled level with eyes with good turnup and layback. Ears correct with neat fitting lips. Coat texture good and harsh. Movement true but a little close. Still very much a puppy. When he matures and fills out and becomes

more masculine he has the potential to be quite special. Puppy In Show



Junior Dog- 1<sup>st</sup> 3. Frenchgriff Bertie Beetle. A red smooth coat with a good square compact body, level top line with correct tail set and neat feet. Well placed ears carried correctly. Would prefer shorter foreface with deeper set nose and



layback. His expression could be more typical. Junior in Show

Intermediate Dog – 2 exhibits – a close decision 1<sup>st</sup> 4. Nevafollo Bertie Botts. A red smooth of good type with correct head and expression. Square with level top line, good tail set and neat feet. Moved a little close behind. Intermediate in Show

2<sup>nd</sup> 5. Ch Balliol Quentin Quisp. A red smooth coat with correct head and good expression. Large deep set nose, dark eyes and well placed ears. Not quite as compact and cobby. Slightly more leggy than the first in class



Aust Bred Dog – 1<sup>st</sup> 7. Ch Nevafollo Fizzing Whizzbees. Red smooth coatsquare dog with level top line with good chest and body. Head medium



sized with good chin, stop and turnup. Lips neat fitting. Eyes dark and medium sized with correct expression. Opposite Aust Bred in Show

2<sup>nd</sup> 6. Kango Ebony Prince. A wire coated dog of good type with a well shaped head, large dark eyes, good size, nose pad deeply positioned, correct ear set, neat lips and good expression. The black wire coat had red through it and would

prefer harsher texture but this could be a presentation problem. Unfortunately, he lacked confidence and moved close behind





**Bred by Exhibitor-** 1<sup>st</sup> Ch Nevaending Sinners and Saints. A red wire coated dog with a very good outline and balance, correct expression. A large well shaped head, good dark eye, well placed ears, good chin, stop and turn up. Neat fitting lips. Movement true. His coat unfortunately let him down. Opposite Bred by Exhibitor in Show

#### **Open Dog** Two in Class

1<sup>st</sup> 10. Ch Balliol Nicholas de Nimsey. A

red wire haired dog of very good type. Square, compact, well sprung ribs, level top line, correct tail set and moved correctly. Head large and round, deep set nose placed correctly between and level with eyes. Good wide lower jaw, chin, stop and turn up.as with many of the wire coats was in transition. A neat unexaggerated dog deserving his Res Dog Challenge and Runner Up Best in Show









2<sup>nd</sup> 9. Ch Krusayd Griffon Don Diego. A B/T wire coated dog of good type, square compact body, with correct head with excellent large dark eyes, deep set nose placed correctly. Good expression. Ears were a little low set. Would prefer slightly more neck and a better tail carriage.

#### Veteran Dog

1<sup>st</sup> 13. Ch Los Chatos Del Norte Rasta Man. A red wire dog of excellent type and balance. My Notes say WOW. – nothing to change. A compact square dog with well sprung ribs, level top line, good chest. Masculine and full of quality. Head large and round, large black nose pad, deep set with correct lay back Wide lower jaw, correct turn up, with neat fitting lips. Coat crisp and harsh. Well deserved challenge dog and Best in Show





2<sup>nd</sup> Ch Balliol Kaptain Krum- not the type I prefer

#### **Bitches**

**Baby Puppy Bitch** 1<sup>st</sup> 14 Kango Princess Z. B/T wire coated puppy of very nice type. Square compact body, level top line, tail set a little low but carries

correctly. Head was correct with sweet cheeky expression. Movement true. At this stage I felt she was a little light in body and substance. A nice baby. Opposite Baby in Show





*Minor Puppy Bitch* 1<sup>st</sup> 16.Rosndae Amber Sparkle. A red smooth coated bitch of very good type and balance. A feminine head with very good chin, stop, turnup. Ears correct, neat fitting lips with excellent large dark expressive eyes. Tail set slightly low and unfortunately unsettled on the move. Minor Puppy in Show

**Puppy Bitch** 1<sup>st</sup> 17. Kango Foxy Roxy. A red smooth coated bitch of nice type. Square, compact, a little wide in front and tail set a little low. Head correct shape, nose deep set with good lay back and level with eyes. Good turn up, deep stop, neat fitting lips. Prefer ears to be higher on the head. She was unsettled and lacked confidence on the move. Carried her tail down. Puppy in Show

#### Intermediate Bitch 3 in class





1<sup>st</sup> 19. Ch Nagpuni Vieux Curee. A red wire bitch of good type. BOddy square, compact, level top line with correct tail set and neat feet. Head correct with good chin and turn up, deep stop, and deep set nose with lay back. Ears correct, eyes a little small but correct pert expression. Movement was true and correct. Opposite Intermediate in Show

2<sup>nd</sup> 20. Nagpuni Love is a Game. A red smooth coated bitch of good type. Similar comments to the 1<sup>st</sup> place but this bitch bad correct large dark eyes however her movement was not as correct.

3<sup>rd</sup>. 18. Balliol Queenie Quickspell. A red smooth bitch of a different type to the two above

#### Aust Bred Bitch 6 in class

1<sup>st</sup> 25. Troubadour Mirto Lamentosa. A B/T wire bitch of very good type. Correct square

compact body, well sprung ribs, level top line, correct tail carriage. Correct head with chin and good turn up. Excellent large dark eyes, deep set nose correctly placed level with the eyes. True Griffon expression, Movement a little close behind. Aust Bred in Show



2<sup>nd</sup> 24. Ch Balliol Poppy Pomphrey. A red smooth coated bitch of good typ. A good square compact body, excellent tail set and carriage. Prefer less rise

over the loin. A typical feminine head, correct chin and turn up, lips neat fitting with good pert expression. Would prefer slightly shorter nose. Movement true and correct.





3<sup>rd</sup> 22. Nevaending Louisiana Magic. A B/T wire coated bitch of good type. Smaller size but correct square, compact body. Correct feminine head and movement. Very close decision between 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup>



**Bred by Exhibitor** 1<sup>st</sup> 27. Ch Nagpuni Ginger Spice. A red smooth coated bitch of excellent type. Sturdy compact body, level top line, good chest,



small compact feet. Very nice feminine head, well positioned deep set nose, neat lips, excellent wide chin and turn up and correct lay back Prefer ears higher set, A worthy challenge winner. In in General Specials, after two shows and at the end of a hot, humid day, she was losing interest and did not carry her tail as correctly

as earlier in the day. Bitch Challenge Best Bred by Exhibitor in Show

1<sup>st</sup> 29. Ch Balliol Tilly Tonks of Raweke. A red smooth coated bitch of good type. Well balanced square, compact bitch with level top line and correct tail. Typical female head with good wide lower jaw and chin with turn up. Dark eyes, deep set nose and stop. Ears carries high and slightly flying. Opposite Open in Show



2<sup>nd</sup> 28. Nevaending Dark Fortune, A small B/T wire coated bitch of good type and balance. Body square, compact with good spring of rib. Level top line and tail set correct. A very good feminine head and correct pert expression. A close decision between 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup>.

3<sup>rd</sup> 30. Nevafollo Mischief Managed. A red wire coated bitch with s good head, correct chin, deep set nose, correct expression. Top line had a slight rise in the loin and the tail was a little low set. Would prefer a harsher textured coat. Movement was unsettled.

**Veteran Bitch** 1<sup>st</sup> 31. Ch Nagpuni Shaken Not Stirred. A red wire coated bitch of excellent type. My notes say "Just my type". Compact square body, well sprung ribs, level top line, correct tail set. Excellent feminine head, Large black nose set deep, well positioned ears and true Griffon expression. Out of coat but texture correct. Unfortunately, her hind movement let her down, however a very worthy Reserve Challenge winner. Opposite Veteran in Show



#### **Understanding your Griffon's seasons** (information from The Kennel Club UK)



If you own a bitch (female dog) that hasn't been neutered, it's important to understand when your dog is likely to have her first season, how often they happen, what to expect and symptoms to keep an eye out for that she's in heat. As a responsible dog owner, you are the one who needs to ensure that accidents don't occur.

#### What is a season?

A dog's season, otherwise known as being 'in heat', is the part of a female's reproductive cycle that can allow her to become pregnant. When she is in season, your dog may act differently and her genitals may swell and produce a discharge. Knowing how to recognise the signs of heat, and being able to roughly predict when a dog is in season, can help owners avoid unwanted pregnancies and allow breeders to know when their dog is fertile.

#### Your dog's first season

Your dog's breed and size play a big part in when she is likely to have her first season. Most smaller breeds can have their first season at around six months old, but this can vary quite a lot from dog to dog, while some larger breeds may not go in to heat until they are over a year old. Having her first season is a sign that she is now sexually mature and is physically able to have puppies. For some dogs, it's obvious that they're having a season, while for others, the signs may be more subtle.

#### How often do dogs come into season?

After your dog has had her first season, she is likely to continue to have regular seasons, usually every six to seven months. How regular your dog's seasons are can depend on her size and breed. Younger dogs may have irregular seasons to start with, but these usually settle down and become more consistent within a few seasons. Your dog's seasons can be affected by being in the company of other females that are in season.

#### At what age does a dog stop having seasons?

Dogs don't go through the menopause like humans do. Instead, they carry-on having seasons throughout their life. This means that they are able to get pregnant at any age. The ANKC will not usually register a litter to a dam over the age of eight, without a veterinary certificate and responsible breeders won't breed from a dog once they are at this age because of an increased risk




of complications during pregnancy and birth. As your dog gets older, the length of time between their seasons can get longer. This is nothing to worry about and is just part of the aging process.

#### How long is a season?

Dogs are usually in season for about three weeks, but this may be as short as two weeks or as long as four.

Signs your dog is coming into season Some dogs may have very obvious physical signs that they are in heat, while others may be more subtle.

Signs your dog is in season may include:



Their vulva (the outer parts of their

genitals) becoming swollen and red. Some dogs may be more noticeable than others. This change usually happens a few days before they begin to bleed. Some swell noticeably, some hardly swell at all. As an owner you need to be very vigilant

- A vaginal discharge that can start off bloody but may become watery and more pinkish as their season progresses. For some dogs, the discharge may be more yellow in colour or can be brown
- Cleaning their genitals more than usual by licking them
- Weeing more often

Some females may bleed heavily, and this may be normal for your dog, but if you are concerned then always speak to your vet for advice.

#### Common behaviours of dogs in season

As your dog comes into season, and certain hormones begin to increase, you may notice her behaving differently. This might include:

- Being more friendly to other dogs, particularly males
- Going out of her way to look for potential mates. When in season, and especially as she becomes more fertile, she may be less inclined to return to you when called
- Mounting other dogs, pets, furniture, toys or you
- Moving her tail to one side when touched or when around male dogs
- Being anxious, clingy, fidgety or nervous
- Nesting or gathering toys where she sleeps
- Being off her food
- Being more domineering
- Marking her territory with urine
- Being defensive of other dogs going near her rear end

Your dog's behaviour may change throughout her season, for example she may be defensive of dogs sniffing her at the beginning or at the end of her season, but may be keen to let them investigate her when she is most fertile. All of these behaviours are natural and nothing to be concerned about and should disappear once she's finished her season.

#### How long does a dog in heat bleed?

Most dog's bleed for roughly seven to 10 days (around half of their cycle). Your dog bleeding is a sign that their body is undergoing changes that help her to become fertile.

#### How much does a dog in season bleed?

Some dogs may bleed heavily, while for others it may be barely noticeable. Although some dogs may have a very obvious bloody discharge, it may be less noticeable depending on how much they groom and clean themselves. Some Griffons don't really bleed very much at all.



#### Do dogs get 'period' cramps?

It is difficult to tell. Without dogs being able to tell us how they feel, it is hard to know what your dog is going through, but we suspect that it's generally not painful. Some dogs do seem to be uncomfortable during their season and may be a little fidgety, but it is unusual for there to be any obvious signs of pain.

#### Do female dogs hump when they come into season?

Yes. A surge in hormones may cause your dog to want to mate and is a common sign of a female in heat. She may try to mount or thrust on other dogs (male or female), other pets, toys, furniture, cushions or even you (especially legs).

#### Do dogs pee more when in season?

When your dog is in season, she may pee more often and may use her urine to scent mark when out for a walk, in the garden or even around the house. When in heat, your dog's urine contains hormones and pheromones that tell other dogs that she is fertile. Male dogs can smell these hormones and may try to visit her, or may urinate near your house in an attempt to stake their claim.

#### How to take care for a dog when she is in heat

During her season, your dog may seem uncomfortable, anxious and a little confused about the



changes that are occurring to her body. All dogs are different and some dogs may need more comforting than others. To help your dog you could:

• Keep her distracted with games and play these around the house

• Take her for regular exercise (away from male dogs who may show an interest in her) or exercise her in her garden

• Give her a treat filled toy – remember to count these as part of her daily calorie intake

# How can I keep my house clean with a dog in heat?

Each dog is different, some dogs may not bleed a lot, and others may be meticulously clean and lick themselves to get rid of any discharge. However, if you're concerned about your dog making a mess when in season then you could limit her access to sofas, bedding and carpeted areas. Some people put down plenty of towels in areas that their dog

usually sits and others use special pants that help to catch the blood.

#### Can you get 'period pants' for dogs in season?

Yes. If your dog tends to bleed heavily during her season, then you can buy pants specifically designed for dogs that stop them bleeding on the floor and furniture. Some dogs may not find them comfortable, so try getting your dog used to them before they're in season. Remember that although these pants may do a good job of keeping your house clean, they **will not** be effective at preventing her from attracting a mate or successfully mating.

#### Should I walk a dog in season?

Ideally No. During her season, your dog will be very interesting and attractive to males, and the feeling may be mutual, especially when she's ovulating. To prevent any unwanted interest, or accidental matings, if you have to walk her, it may be best to walk your dog at quieter times of the

day and stick to quieter areas where you know not many people walk their dog. During this time, **always keep your dog on the lead** to stop her from running off to a potential mate. Keep her close by in case any interested males do come too close. If possible, you could give them exercise and stimulation at home or in your garden.

#### Complications of dogs' seasons

After a dog's season, some dogs may show signs of a false pregnancy. This is a condition that causes them to act as if they were pregnant when they are actually not, with them producing milk and even gathering objects into a nest as if they were puppies.

False pregnancy is caused by a change in hormones and is common in unneutered dogs. Many dogs will experience these effects and recover from them naturally, but they can be stressful and can lead to more serious complications, such as pyometra. Pyometra is accumulation of pus in the uterus (womb), which can be life threatening.

Signs of 'pyometra can include:

- Being off her food
- Seeming tired
- Being sick
- Drinking more
- Licking her genitals
- Having a smelly vaginal discharge.

If you notice any changes in the patterns of your dog's season, especially if they appear to remain in season for an unusually long time, you should talk to your vet.

# Dogs seasons and mating - when to mate your dog

All responsible breeders recommend waiting until your dog is physically and



mentally mature before mating them. This usually means letting them have several seasons before breeding.

Female dogs are only fertile when they are in heat. Once she is in season, the time that your dog releases her eggs and becomes keen to mate, usually coincides with her discharge becoming watery. You could use this as a sign to mate your dog, but some dogs may not have very noticeable discharge and using this method is not very reliable. There are two tests that your vet can perform that are more accurate. These include a vaginal smear test and a blood test that checks progesterone levels. **Understanding the stages of your dog's season** 

During a dog's reproductive cycle, changes in her hormone levels cause her to behave differently and for her genitals to undergo a change, all to increase the ability of her becoming pregnant. There are four main stages to a dog's reproductive cycle and these are:

- **Proestrus**: A dog's oestrogen levels start to rise in preparation for her to release her ova (eggs). Her vulva may swell and she may produce a bloody discharge. Although male dogs may begin to take an interest in her, she may not be keen to mate, and may not be happy about dogs sniffing around her. This stage usually lasts for around nine days, but varies from dog to dog.
- **Oestrus**: As her oestrogen levels drop, her progesterone levels begin to increase. This is the time when your dog is most fertile. She will have released her eggs and will allow herself to be mated. Her vulva will still be swollen and her discharge will be less bloody and may now be pink or straw coloured. She may present herself to males and may move her tail out of the way to encourage males to mate. This stage usually lasts just a few days.





- **Diestrus**: During this stage, your dog will no longer be fertile, but she will still be producing progesterone to help if she's pregnant. During this time, her vulva will become less swollen and she will show less interest in mating and in males. If she is not pregnant, high levels of progesterone can cause phantom pregnancies.
- **Anoestrus**: This is the time when her hormone levels return to normal and is the period before her next heat cycle begins.

#### How long after bleeding is a dog fertile?

In humans, a woman's period is a sign that she has finished ovulating, but in dogs it's actually a sign that they are about to become more fertile. Dog's may start with a very bloody discharge, but this changes and become watery over time. This can indicate that she is at her most fertile and this stage can last for around 10 days, but varies from dog to dog and may be breed dependant.

#### What if my dog mates during her season?

If your dog mates during her season, and it was not an intentional mating, then speak to your vet as soon as possible. There are certain injections that can be used within the first few days after mating that can prevent pregnancy. Your vet will be able to give you advice about your options and can discuss any risks involved.

#### How to prevent pregnancy when in season

During your dog's season, she will become very attractive to males and may be keen on mating with them. To prevent your dog from becoming pregnant, it is important that you keep her away from male dogs.

To do this you could:

- Walk her on a lead at quieter times of the day, or in places where there are fewer dogs
- Avoid taking her around to other people's houses who have unneutered males, or to any socialisation classes
- Avoid leaving her alone in the garden. Some males may be able to smell that she is in heat and may try to get into your garden to mate with her
- If you have any unneutered male dogs in the house, and do not want them to mate, then you **must** keep them separated for the entire time


#### Can a dog get pregnant when not in heat?

No. Your dog can only get pregnant when they are in season, but most bitches will only mate when they are in season. If your dog has let herself be mated, then it could be that she is in heat. This is the time that their body becomes most fertile and releases an egg, ready for fertilisation. They are most fertile for several days in the middle of their heat cycle. But it's still possible that, due to sperm usually being viable for several days (or even up to two weeks) after mating, if they are mated before their most fertile period, they can still become pregnant.



#### Not breeding from your dog? Have you considered neutering?

If you're not thinking of mating your dog, then you may want to consider investigating whether to have them neutered. Neutering is a common operation. It stops your dog from getting pregnant and means that they don't have seasons anymore. Neutering can also reduce certain behaviours and lowers the risk of certain health issues.

As you may have seen a Virgin Australia Airline public announcement regarding an intention to allow pets to travel with passengers in the aircraft cabin in certain circumstances.

This is an innovative proposal for the Australian aviation industry and as such it will take some effort to gain regulatory approvals before it can become a reality. As part of the feasibility exercise the Airline is seeking input from stakeholders, as such it would be appropriate for you to submit any concerns you may have to us for inclusion in the review.

Points to note:

- This is an Airline initiative.
- Regulatory approval is required (DOHA, Airports, and CASA to be consulted) before this can become a reality.
- Restricted to less than 8kg in total for pet and crate, with a passenger flying, limited sectors only and limited numbers per flight.
- Virgin Cargo's initial review indicates that under the old PAX AVI product pre COVID the total numbers per annum meeting the restricted weight criteria were 1,707.
- Should this initiative become a reality it is expected the Airline will promote it extensively and potentially stimulate
  additional interest in travelling with pets, over and above the restricted criteria suggested for this product.
- We anticipate many public updates over the next 12 months as this project meets various milestones.







# The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW Inc Breeders Code of Ethics and Conduct

The guidelines are as follows:

- Pre mating testing of prospective parents. Tests to be carried out if validated as a proven scientific screening method and if the evidence indicates that such testing is required in the breed due to scientific validated evidence that indicates a breed concern.
   DNA tests to be carried out if available and relevant. (Note: The only DNA tests available for for Griffons at the present time are for colour inheritance and parentage. There are NO DNA health tests available for Griffons)
- Subject to veterinary advice, no mating where tests indicate inadvisable
- Microchip puppies prior to sale
- Puppy microchip numbers to be included in the Application to Register litter.
- Presale veterinary checks on puppies with written report by veterinary surgeon if required
- Copies of parent's test results and puppy vet check results to be made available to prospective purchasers if requested
- Prospective purchasers can, prior to purchase, view puppies with mother where litter was born and raised. (This will not occur until the pups are vaccinated and protected)
- Provide detailed information on puppy care and welfare to purchasers (All relevant documentation connected with the puppy including inter alia, advice on feeding and care, registration documents, (if already issued) details of vaccinations etc are handed over to the purchaser at the time of sale. When an appropriate contract is available it should be signed by both parties. If registration documents are not available at the time of sale the breeder must comply with Dogs NSW Regulations Part 1 Register and Registration Clauses 13.9 13.11)
- To observe proper standards of management in regard to the housing, health, exercising and socialising of all dogs on the premises managed by the registered breeder. (It is strongly recommended that Accredited Breeders follow the guidelines contained in the NSW Animal Welfare Code of Practice "Breeding Dogs and Cats").
- To ensure that all pups are raised in a home environment and are treated as a member of the family. They are not kennelled outside or kept exclusively as kennelled dogs. The mother is also not a kennelled dog but is a member of the household and is treated as such.
- To keep all pups until **10-12** weeks of age and to ensure that they are socialised prior to leaving.
- To ensure that the breeder is completely honest with the puppy buyer regarding any health issues that may occur
- To ensure that the breeder provides the new owner with detailed information on maintaining the Griffons health and welfare- including information on:
  - o the dangers of overexercising in the first 12 months,
  - the dangers of allowing a pup to jump on and off furniture or run up and down stairs,
  - the dangers of early desexing
  - the need for a correct and nutritionally balanced diet to ensure that the pup grows into a strong and healthy adult

# **Explanation of Terms for Breeders Scheme**

Pre mating testing of prospective parents.

Note: Disease testing means:

Testing for health conditions which are notified by the breed club, ANKC or Dogs NSW as relevant to the breed, and for which scientifically validated, reliable, readily available and cost effective screening procedures are available.

DNA tests for hereditary diseases that are available in the relevant breed. At the present time the most recent comprehensive health survey on the Griffon Bruxellois internationally was carried out by The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW in 2016.

This survey of over 9,000 Griffons identified the most common health issues as; Slipping Patellas, Cleft Palates and undescended testes. At the present time there are no DNA tests available for Griffon Bruxellois.

The CGBC of NSW recommends veterinary checks of all breeding dogs prior to breeding. However, we do not recommend the unnecessary use of anaesthetic to test for conditions that are rare or non- existent in the breed or if the dog does not show any symptoms.

The CGBC of NSW believes that all health testing should be done with the welfare and quality of life experienced by the dog as the prime consideration and the terms of the Accreditation: *scientifically validated, reliable, readily available and cost- effective screening procedures are available* should at all times be kept in mind

In reference to the health conditions identified by the Health Survey we have the following comments:

*Cleft Palate* – The majority of pups born with this condition are euthanised at birth. Some pups are able to be hand reared by breeders. Breeding not supported

**Undescended Testes**- This is not a life threatening condition and dogs are usually castrated and live normal healthy lives. Breeding not supported.

**Patella Luxation**- This condition has various grades of severity. A vet can diagnose the condition in a normal physical examination. Further testing/grading available if a condition is identified. Breeding not supported. Pups have loose ligaments that slowly tighten in the first 12 months of life. Permanent grading cannot be done until the dog is over 12 months.

**Anasarca**-a condition that commonly affects brachycephalic breeds. While linked to a specific

phenotype there is insufficient research to indicate if it is hereditary. If the pup lives, we would expect the breeder to be guided by veterinary advice.

*Inguinal/Scrotal Hernia*- this can be diagnosed by a normal veterinary examination. It can be a life-threatening condition and can be hereditary. Breeding not supported

(Please note this is not to be confused with an umbilical hernia which is usually not a problem)

**SM/CM** – The CGBC of NSW supports the research into this condition and supports breeders who have assisted the research by getting their dogs MRI'd. We acknowledge that at the present it is still very much in the research stage. This procedure so far does not meet with any of the definitions for testing at the present time as it is not yet *scientifically validated, reliable, readily available* or *a cost effective screening procedure(s)*.

MRI's are still a diagnostic process, not a screening process and a permanent grade for a Griffon cannot be issued until the dog is 3.5 years or over.

There are guidelines for breeding published by Claire Rushbridge (UK) which the club recommends members follow as far as is possible but at the present stage it is not essential that members MRI their dogs in order to be accredited as this is still in the research phase.

However, we do recommend that breeders are fully familiar with the genetic lines behind their dogs and take all precautions, including diagnosis, to ensure that they do not breed dogs with this condition.

### Other Conditions:

*Hips*:There is limited evidence that a condition such as H.D is a major issue in the breed in this country.

The club recommends hip X rays with formal, recognized grading if the breeder, after veterinary consultation, feels it is necessary.

The club does not recognize any diagnosis carried out by a vet which is not formally graded under the approved CHEDS grading scheme.

**Eyes**. We recommend that the eyes are checked during the usual annual veterinary examination. If symptoms of an eye problem are identified by the vet then we recommend a visit to a canine ophthalmologist but do not consider it necessary if the dog does not display symptoms. **Stenotic Nares**. In a limited number of cases we are aware that Griffons have been born with Stenotic Nares. Whilst it is possible that these dogs can have the nostrils enlarged to enable them to breathe we do not support the breeding from affected animals and members who have done so would not be accredited.

Equally we do not support breeding from Griffons who have required surgery for elongated soft palates or narrowed tracheas if these issues are diagnosed as hereditary.

Presale veterinary checks on puppies with written report by veterinary surgeon Copies of parents test results and puppy vet check results to be made available to prospective purchasers

Puppies are vaccinated and checked by a vet at 6-8 weeks of age.

Accredited breeders keep the pups until 10 -12 weeks when they are again vaccinated and vet checked. These check-ups can be considered as a pre- sale vet check. It is not necessary to have an additional vet check prior to sale.

The normal veterinary certificate is sufficient if the pup is healthy and free of health problems. However, if the pup is diagnosed with a health problem the CGBC of NSW expects that breeders will fully inform the prospective purchaser prior to sale.

The CGBC of NSW believes that our member breeders have the love of the breed and the welfare of the breed as their number one priority.

### **Buyers Rights and Responsibilities**

- The majority of breeders do not ask for a deposit. However if a breeder requires one-NEVER pay
  a deposit until after the puppies have been born or there is a puppy available or you have visited
  the litter. Deposits are refundable under Australian Consumer Law unless you change your
  mind. The dam may not conceive or there might not be enough puppies born. Alternatively, your
  circumstances might unexpectedly change because of ill health, a work transfer or other
  unexpected event.
- If you buy a puppy with purchase conditions about future breeding or showing called "breeder's terms", make sure these are spelled out in a written contract, which both breeder and buyer sign and retain respective copies of. Be clear about the conditions and contact The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW if you are concerned or do not quite understand the terminology. This will avoid disagreements later. The breeder should explain every aspect of the agreement.
- You should view the Certificate of Registration and Pedigree for both the dam and sire before paying for the pup. The registration should be ANKC and the pups will be Limited or Main register. See further information -Choosing a Breeder.

### If there is a problem - a consumer's right to a remedy

- If you have purchased a pet and something goes wrong, you may have rights against the seller if they failed to meet one or more of the consumer guarantees. Many breeders will sell with a written contract that detail this. Please read carefully and contact The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW if you are unsure
- Generally, you are not entitled to a remedy if you change your mind about a purchase or if the problem is due to something beyond the seller's control. However, if the seller provided an 'express' warranty or an additional promise about the quality, condition, performance or characteristics of the item purchased, they must uphold that guarantee.

• Your entitled remedy will depend on the issue and whether the problem can be classified as major or minor. Effectively, a major problem is when you wouldn't have bought the pet if you had known the nature and extent of the problem prior to purchase; for example, an animal has a terminal or serious health issue.

In this case, the consumer has the right to choose which remedy the seller will provide. This will either be to:

- have the problem with your pet corrected for example, with veterinary
- treatment and/or medication;
- return your pet to the seller and have it replaced with another one; or
- return your pet to the seller and have your money refunded.
- When the problem is minor, the seller can choose which remedy they will provide.
- It is recommended that you attempt to negotiate an outcome that both you and the seller can agree to.

If there continues to be a disagreement, Consumer Protection can provide advice and help you resolve the dispute.

(Note: it is the buyer/consumer who has the right to choose which remedy – such as a refund - if there is a problem with the health of a puppy).

It has come to our attention that some breeders may be falsely asserting their involvement with our club. Please contact us directly to check any breeders involvement with us.
