As I was compiling this issue, I was advised of the very sad passing of one of the matriarchs of Griffons in Australia, Beth Canavan. Beth had been a long-time supporter of Griffons and worked tirelessly for The Griffon Bruxellois Club in Victoria, promoting the breed.

In her time, she filled every major position in the club as well as breeding Griffons under the Azande prefix. She promoted the black and tan Griffons as well as breeding reds, and many black and tan dogs will have an Azande dog in the background.

Her knowledge of pedigrees and past dogs made her

invaluable as an unofficial breed historian and she was always happy to share information.

Her last show dog was a red rough boy called Ch Azande Little Red Wagon and she won Best in Show with him at The Griffon Bruxellois Club of Victoria under Sandie Meads

Beth had been battling ill health on and off for several years and her passing is a great loss to the breed in Australia

It is with much sadness that the Club announces the passing of Beth Canavan (Elizabeth).

Beth was a long time member of the Club and served 32 years as its Secretary, then President and Committee member. She was also one of our Patrons, along with Denis Montfort.



I was fortunate to meet her when I was a teenager and she has been a wonderful friend and mentor over the years. When she was preparing for a litter I was tea maker and company. (I was also quite good at keeping puppies warm down my shirt if needed.)

Beth bred many Griffons under the Azande prefix that she shared with her daughter Jennifer. Her latest Champion is Azande Little Red Wagon, known to his friends as Baxter. Beth is survived by her children Jennifer, Len and Roger, their partners and families.

2025 has been a busy year for the club with a number of firsts, thanks to our very pro active committee

Championship Show

Our show in at Easter was highly successful with an entry of 40 dogs, an increase on 2024.

Our Judge for the Gold show was Lance Wright and for the Silver show, Myron Arthur

It was a friendly show and we were pleased to welcome exhibitors and members watching, who enjoyed their first dog show.

SprintDog trial

We ran our first SprintDog trial in 2025 which was a huge success. We partnered with the Newcastle Sprinters group of NABDTC whose help was invaluable and had a total of 22 Griffons competing along with 80 other breeds. A number of Griffons have now gained Sprint Dog titles

Point Score

The club point score competition ran smoothly .

2025 saw the presentation of the Tom Couchman Memorial Point Score Trophy for the first time, to the 2024 winner

Promoting the breed

The Dog Lovers Show was held in August and Victoria Mercer did a fabulous job pulling it all together with volunteers. However, we have concerns about ongoing support for Dog Lovers as they seem to be actively promoting puppy farmers

For Pet Owners

The club organised several informal Griffon gatherings, Griffmas in July and a Christmas party to cater for the pet owners. All were successful with 50 or more Griffons attending

Communication

The club has continued to be very active through social media and has four platforms to promote the club

Educating Puppy Buyers

Demand for pups is slowly increasing but we are still concerned about a number of unregistered puppy farmers in NSW, some now deliberately breeding dilutes as rare.

Members of the club have been very proactive on the local Facebook groups educating potential buyers.

Griffon Buyer Register

The Griffon Buyer Register continues to function smoothly in the hands of Marousa Polias, who has streamlined some of the processes. It not only provides valuable assistance to buyers but is instrumental in increasing club membership

Health

Our club continues to support health research for Griffons. Thanks to Marousa and the members of the Health Committee, the club has recently posted a Breed survey which is a follow up of the Breed survey carried out in 2016. Once again this will provide a valuable insight into the health of the breed internationally and provide factual information.

The club also conducted our first RFG testing day, open to Griffons and other brachycephalic breeds. It was conducted by Dr Michelle Dalli at North Richmond vets

Membership

Our membership has remained stable and we currently have over 170 members who are all Griffon owners or Griffon lovers.

Rescue

The RSPCA surrendered 3 seized Griffons from a puppy farm to the club. In the past they have been reluctant to work with the club so we hope that this will be a positive step for future relations with them. The 3 boys were in dreadful condition but after several months in foster care are now ready for adoption

Newsletter

The club produces a newsletter 'The Phoenix' which is issued quarterly and is full of information from Australia and overseas with items of interest for all Griffon lovers.

As in most clubs in this busy life we have a small but very hardworking committee.

A strong focus this year was building Membership. Retention of membership was high over the renewal period which was a great start. I created a weekly automated Facebook post in order to welcome new members to the group that includes links to join the Club and Buyer Register if not already joined.

We are currently at 200 members which is 39 more than when I wrote my Secretary Report last year. A great result!

We have successfully and positively maintained our engagement with our Membership by hosting meetups during the year and utilising Mailchimp for our communication during the year. Engagement on all platforms (Facebook, Mailchimp, Google My Business) remains consistent.

Thank you to the Breeder-Members who supported the Knose Pet Insurance initiative. So far we have raised \$1100.00 with some other Breeder-Members still being followed up.

It was a new and positive experience dealing with the RSPCA when the 3 rescue griffons were surrendered to them. I was able to act quickly to ensure the dogs came directly to us. I would like to sincerely thank Michelle Parker-Brien, Jannelle and Adam Tremenheere and Ash and Tiffany Barber-

Dale for stepping in to foster and rehabilitate the rescue boys. I wish to reach out to the RSPCA and possibly the Animal Welfare League on a semi-regular basis with photos of our breed to advise we have a committed and caring Rescue Team if any dogs come into their care.

The Buyer Register is moving along slowly. Several registered parties go on to research adding family members via Dogz Online or their circumstances change so often they are no longer looking when the time comes to contact them which is WAY outside my control and influence! I cannot stress the importance of communication from Breeders. If Breeders do not inform me of puppies they have available, I am unable to assist with referrals. I work full-time and run 2 small businesses. As one person, it is unreasonable for breeders to expect that they will be contacted regularly to find out if they have anything available. I do not favour any particular Breeder/s and I perform my duties with care and respect.

We need to focus on working together as best as we possibly can. It's very sad that some choose to intentionally hurt others' integrity. This is unacceptable and we need to enforce our Code of Conduct and Code of Ethics to set a precedent. Our Breed should be the main priority not money or pride or whatever else drives these behaviours.

I look forward to continuing to work in the best interests of the Club if I am voted in for next year. I am extremely committed to the role and my passion for the Griffon Bruxellois breed is burning bright.

Finally, I would like to thank our Treasurer Matt, for everything throughout the year and President, Michelle, for all her support and guidance. It is always a pleasure working so closely and I appreciate everything.

Club first RFG Testing Day

In September 2025, the club ran an RFG test day to test for BOAS in dogs. This day was conducted by Dr Michelle Dalli from North Richmond vet, who is trained in the RFG test method that was developed by Dr Jane Ladlow of Cambridge University. Dr Ladlow is the world's leading specialist in BOAS. Sadly, there are insufficient vets in Australia who have been trained to carry out this test and we were very grateful to Dr Dalli for giving up her time

Doing the test

RFG stands for Respiratory Function Grading and is designed to test a dog's efficiency in breathing, both standing and after exercise. It is a non-invasive method of testing to ascertain if a dog is affected.

BOAS stands for Brachycephalic Obstructive Airways

Syndrome and is a condition that can manifest in a variety of ways- narrow nostrils (stenotic nares), elongated soft palate, narrow trachea, large laryngeal saccules. A dog with BOAS has difficulty breathing and is often tired, feels the heat, snores a lot, regurgitates food, has to sleep sitting upright etc. They require surgery in order to have a long and healthy life

Because some brachycephalic breeds like Pugs, French Bulldogs and British Bulldogs have been bred in large quantities by greedy puppy farmers who don't care about health, the incidents of BOAS have reached huge proportions.

However, well bred dogs from responsible breeders don't have these problems. This is why the club supports this testing.

Dr Dalli and some of the Griffons



The RFG test consists of a check, by a vet on heart and breathing when the dog is calm and stationary. The dog is then exercised at a steady trot for 3 minutes and the dog is checked again.

Our club had 12 dogs participating, 9 Griffons, 1 Affenpinscher, 2 King Charles Spaniels. I am pleased to say that 8/9 Griffons were graded 0. The other was a known case.

Thank you to our secretary, Marousa, who organised the test day and to Dr Dalli for making it possible. Dr Dalli is also a Griffon owner and we were able to get a photo with her Griffons and some of the Griffons tested

We will hold another RFG day later in this year.

2024 Health Survey

The survey was conducted over a 4-month period from 23rd October 2024 until 22nd February 2025.

The survey was sent out to our Club database, was distributed to other Clubs to send out to their database, linked on our Instagram and Facebook profiles and was promoted on as many legitimate Griffon Bruxellois-related groups as possible on Facebook. Some Facebook groups elected not to publish the survey which was unfortunate because we wanted it to reach as many current and former owners as possible.

The survey was anonymous and was conducted by Survey Planet. The settings allowed the survey to be completed once only by respondents.

Following the ban of breeding of brachycephalic breeds in The Netherlands and with numerous groups supporting such trends, the purpose of the survey was to collect data to gain an understanding of the overall health of the breed globally, compare the findings to past survey/s and as a Breed Club, assess whether any major issues need addressing. Our priority as a Club is to campaign for the preservation of the Breed and therefore breed health knowledge is of great importance.

This survey was designed to offer a snapshot highlighting the health of the breed. The survey has collected results from a specific period of time and indicates health issues impacting Griffons during this time as outlined by Owners and Breeders. Results will be made available to Breeders, Owners and Clubs. This survey is not intended to provide specific medical details, provide details of testing or treatment, identify countries, Breeders, Owners, researchers, veterinarians recommend future treatment, research or direction.

The survey consisted of 19 mandatory questions some of which required either entry of specific information or multiple choice options and 2 additional optional questions at the end of the survey that allowed free comments to be submitted.

We note that the survey did not distinguish between Owners and Breeders and it is possible that the results could be duplicated for an individual dog if both the new Owner of the dog and the Breeder reported on a particular condition. Duplication such as this is unavoidable but needs to be taken into consideration when assessing the results.

The survey:

- was completed 238 times and covers a total of 4561 dogs - 1782 owned and 2779 bred.
- saw the lowest number recorded from a single respondent as 0
- saw the highest number from a single respondent as 300.

The most common issue identified was Umbilical Hernia with 8.59% of dogs impacted and the second most common issue was Patella Luxation with 8.53% of dogs impacted by this issue. The most common issue identified by respondents related to breeding was Cleft Palate where 8.31% of dogs were impacted by this issue.

This survey itself will deliberately draw no conclusions - that is up to the individual breeders and clubs. A full break down of all responses – untouched and unadulterated can be seen on the following pages and here:




Summary

Participants

The majority of participants were pet owners (60.7%), followed by breeder/exhibitors (18.2%). The pet owners have no vested interest in presenting false statistics so we can assume that the results are accurate. If there was a bias, it would be skewed towards increasing issues rather than reducing them as a breeder could identify a condition and the pet owner who bought the dog, may identify the same condition, therefore doubling the incident report

The majority of respondents were Australian but a total of 19 countries participated.

The majority of respondents had been involved with Griffons for 5 years with the longest breed involvement 60 years. Collectively there were decades of Griffon owning experience in the survey

The Dogs

The majority of Griffons surveyed were pedigree dogs registered with the recognised Kennel authority (77.1%). 16% were purebred but from unregistered breeders and the remaining majority were either mixed Griffon breed or rescue. (15.1%)

15.1% were bred by the owner, 68.6% were purchased from a recognised National Kennel Club breeder, 28.6% from breeders recommended by the breed club

The Conditions

- Eye-** 21 eye conditions were surveyed. Each condition was surveyed at less than 1%. 80.39% were diagnosed by a canine eye specialist



2. **Neurological**- 1.68% of Griffons were diagnosed with SM/CM by MRI and were symptomatic. Of the 11 neurological conditions listed, the most common were epilepsy and dementia with 0.67% for each. 90.7% of these conditions were diagnosed by a neurological specialist
3. **Structural Conditions**- the most common structural problem was patella luxation (8.53%), followed by hip dysplasia(3.54%). 8 further structural conditions were listed and all were below 1%.
81.40% of structural conditions were diagnosed by a canine specialist, recognised by a national health scheme
4. **Birth Defects** –the most common birth defect was cleft palate (8.31%), and hare lip (1.01%) making a combined total of 9.32%. Additionally, 2.92% of puppies were anasarca babies, and 8.59% had umbilical hernias and 4.21% had undescended testicles over 12 months.
5. **Colour**- 2.69% of Griffons were affected by dilute colour genetics, 81.25% of these dogs were DNA tested by breeders. 15% of Griffons with a dilute coat colour had skin conditions, and 10% of the Griffons with dilute colour had other health conditions
6. **Breathing**- 0.95% of Griffons had Brachycephalic Obstructive Airway Syndrome, 35.29% were diagnosed by a canine respiratory specialist and 58.82% underwent surgery.
7. **Other conditions identified by owners**- the most common, not previously mentioned, were allergies (6.62%) and exaggerated underbite (5.05%).

Comparison with the Results of the 2016 Health Survey

In 2016, the Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW, conducted their first international survey of Griffons.

The survey ran for one month from February to March 2016 and received 457 responses from individuals. These responses referred to over 9,000 Griffons making it the largest survey on the breed ever undertaken and arguably providing the most accurate assessment of the health of the breed in its entire history.

This survey showed the following results as the main health concerns of Griffons;

- Slipping Patellas – 224
- Cleft Palate/ Hair Lip -193
- Undescended testicles -127
- Cataracts - 104
- Inguinal Hernia – 94

The 2025 health survey showed very little change. Slipping patella still remains as the major structural issue but does not appear to have increased, cleft palate/hair lips are still the most common form of birth defect along with small numbers of undescended testicles. All eye issues were in the lowest percentage, all below 1% so it appears that the incidents with cataracts have decreased. Inguinal hernias appear to have decreased with only 1.57% of dogs presenting them.

Conclusions

Overall, this snapshot survey shows that the Griffon Bruxellois breed appears to be in a very healthy position. The previous most commonly identified conditions have not increased and in some cases have diminished as a concern in the breed. These more common conditions are not among the serious or life threatening conditions seen in other breeds.

There have been many comments made over a decades, linking Griffons to high incidences of SM/CM. While no one disputes the seriousness of this condition, it is heartening to note that only 1.68% of Griffons on the survey were identified with this condition.

BOAS and breathing conditions were not a concern when the first survey was conducted. The current survey, identified less than 1% of Griffons with BOAS.

It is of interest and significance that the majority of Griffons were bred by reputable and recognised breeders. 77% of the Griffons in the survey were pedigree Griffons from a recognised breeder, 68.6% identified the breeder as a breeder in a recognised national Kennel Club.

The stability and overall health of the breed is probably due to this factor more than anything else. The people breeding Griffons are primarily people dedicated to the breed, who are aware of health issues and actively try to breed healthy dogs. The puppy farmers who breed for gimmicks like unrecognised coat colours are a minority and only supply a small percent of the market. The survey showed that the dogs with the dilute, unrecognised coat colours had a greater incident of skin problems. These are the dogs most likely to come from commercial unrecognised breeders. Anecdotally, Griffon Breed clubs around the world, are proactive in trying to educate the public about responsible breeding and encourage people to buy their Griffon from reputable breeders. The survey showed that 72.7% of respondents were pet owners (12.7% pet owners who competed in exhibition or performance sports). Only 6.5% of respondents were breeders, so it is clear that the pet owners and Griffon purchasers are benefiting from the responsible breeding practices of the majority of the breeders.

In the long term, if we wish to keep the breed healthy, it is essential that it is not undermined by puppy farmers and commercial irresponsible breeders who will drag it down the path of French Bulldogs, Pugs and British Bulldogs.

It is also essential that the overall, long standing health of Griffons as a breed is not misinterpreted and included in a generalised criticism of all Brachycephalic breeds.



This can only be done if the responsible Kennel club registered breeders are encouraged, and the general public continue to be intelligent enough to only buy from reputable, recognised national Kennel club

Rescue Griffons

2025 saw the RSPCA reach out for the first time and offer to surrender some Griffons to the club. We were told that they had seized 40 dogs from a mass breeder who was breeding for sale in a pet shop. The pet shop closed and the puppy farmer had the dogs in appalling conditions. Most of the dogs were apparently Oodle crosses but they also found the Griffons. We were not told very much due to potential prosecution, but it seems that there was a female Griffon and 3 male Griffons. The female needed both eyes removed due to chronic dry eye and the 3 boys were aged 2, 5 and 7 years, all in emaciated condition. The boys were surrendered from the Rutherford pound and three club members fostered one of each of them.

The RSPCA apparently seized them at the end of May and we collected them in July.

All 3 were still in skeletal conditions, with spine and ribs protruding and dry brittle coat and dry flakey skin, a typical side effect of malnutrition.



The oldest boy, Loki, a black rough, was in the worst condition and he was fostered by our rescue officer, Jannelle Tremenheere.

It took 5 months of care- quality food, grooming to remove dead coat and improve skin, gentle outings to socialise and build confidence, training to teach them how to live as part of a family. Like all Griffons they were very affectionate

and eager to please. A final vet check, showed huge improvements and many of the health conditions that had been identified by the RSPCA, had disappeared with quality care and exercise. By December they were ready for new home.

Loki had ongoing medical conditions due to so many years of neglect so due to his age, Jannelle decided to give him a permanent home. He has settled very happily with his new family

Hopefully there will not be many Griffons in need of rescue as it will mean that more people are breeding them irresponsibly

As can be imagined, the dogs that usually achieve this title are the larger endurance breeds and 20 km is a very long way for a small dog with short little legs. Scent Work

Scent work consists of a dog having to find a hidden scent in a variety of locations; interiors, various shaped containers, exteriors, vehicles. The dog must find the scent within a set time and as the dog progresses there is more than one scent to be found. The tests mimic the work done by drug dogs, customs dogs etc- any dog that is used to scent specific items in


the military or security fields. The scents can be ground level or they can be positioned several feet above the ground which makes it a little more difficult for the small size and shorter legs of the Griffons.

The weather conditions and the wind conditions have a big impact on the way the scent can move and the dogs need the skills to locate the source of the odour

Kelly Pilgrim Byrne, in Western Australia was one of the first people in Australia to compete in scent work with a Griffon and she continued her success in 2025.



Beauty is more than skin deep. A Griffon's appearance can give strong indicators of its current & future health.

Bright, dark eyes, without white showing, mean eye conditions and injuries are less common.



An even bite, without teeth or tongue showing means a Griffon is less likely to suffer from dental or eating issues



Healthy Griffons should have a thick, lush coat. A sparse, dull coat is often a sign of skin issues and illness.



Large, wide open nostrils are far less likely to suffer from any breathing issues

Strong solid bone makes breaks and joint injuries less common

Special thanks to Victoria Mercer who organised it, to Terri and Grant Odell, who set up the stand the day before, the Floods, who dismantled, and to all the volunteers who helped on the stand and talk about our great little Griffons.

Despite the success, 2026 will see the club take a break from Dog Lovers.

The meeting decided that it will be reassessed for 2027. There were many reasons for this.

One the huge amount of time and effort required to organise the stand and the difficulties in getting volunteers with everyone's busy lives.

Also, members expressed concerns in the very commercial direction that Dog Lovers has headed over the 10 or more years since it commenced.

Initially it was promoting responsible dog breeders and dog ownership. Now it seems to be more concerned with making a profit. Large scale puppy farmers are now able to buy breed stands and promote their dogs as a 'breed'. The enormous puppy farm, Tamaruke, in the Hunter Valley, has had a breed stand for several years, deliberately misleading the public by telling them that their oodle crossbreeds are a recognised breed.

2025 saw an increasing number of these stands and the location, not far from the genuine breed stands, made it very difficult for members of the public to differentiate. Our club members were not happy to support this trend of deception by omission. Our club has participated in Dog Lovers every year since its inception so we will evaluate further involvement for 2027.

DOG PAPERS WHATS THE DIFFERENCE?



A pedigree is essentially a birth certificate for your dog showing the three generation family tree and also proves that your dog is in fact purebred.



The Australian National Kennel Council Ltd (ANKC) is the ONLY internationally recognised registry in Australia able to issue certified pedigrees for purebred dogs.

All ANKC breeders must abide by the Code of Ethics outlined on the ANKC website.

The ANKC issues two types of registration papers, main and limited (pictured above), and each puppy brought from an ANKC breeder will come with its own pedigree. ANKC Certified Pedigrees are also the only recognised pedigrees with the state government and local councils.

All other councils such as the MDBA, ABR, Australian Canine Registry, ICBS etc are NOT affiliated with the ANKC and CANNOT issue Certified Pedigrees.

If you wish to confirm that a breeder is registered, contact your ANKC state body from the organisations listed below.

If you are uncertain, ask for the kennel prefix, this can be checked with the ANKC database or contact the our club and we will advise you for free. Some puppy farmer breeders are with a variety of commercial registrations. These are not valid registration systems. They have no checks, all the members have to do is pay money. The ANKC and members states are the only ones internationally recognised.

Never send any money until you are certain. Never send money on a litter that hasn't been born. If a breeder rushes you to pay in case you miss out – run don't walk away.

Don't let the puppy farmers fool you

Don't Be Scammed

A timely warning about scammers and puppy farmers. The club has been advised of unregistered and unregulated puppy farmers advertising pups as pedigree and registered.

Anyone can make up a pedigree but it is not necessarily a true pedigree – it could be fictional. The only genuine pedigrees are those issued by the ANKC. They are either blue(main registration) or

The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW Inc Code of Ethics for Breeders

The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW is an affiliate of Dogs NSW, the NSW body of the Australian National Kennel Council (ANKC) The club expects any members who breed Griffons to abide by the ANKC code of ethics.

This means:

- Any club member who breeds Griffons MUST be a member of the ANKC body of their state and must have an approved ANKC breeder's prefix of their home state. Any bitch they breed from MUST be on ANKC Main registration.
- Any member of the club who has an entire male must not breed that male unless it is on ANKC Main registration and is bred only to a bitch on ANKC Main registration, owned by a person who is a member of the state body of the ANKC and has an ANKC breeders prefix.
- The club does not accept or condone unregistered breeders, cross breeders, backyard breeders or puppy farmers.
- In addition to abiding by the ANKC Code of Ethics for breeders, the club also expects its members, who are breeding Griffons to abide by the following club Code of Ethics

As a breeder member of The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW Inc, I agree to the following:

Aims as a Breeder

1. I shall only breed with the intention of maintaining or improving the quality, the standard of the breed and the health, welfare and soundness of the dogs.
2. I shall strive to eliminate hereditary conditions and diseases within the breed.
3. I shall strive to ensure that any dog I breed is 'fit for function' and the health and physical well being of the dogs shall be of prime importance.
4. I shall take all reasonable efforts to ensure that dogs I breed do not suffer from any disorder which impedes their breathing, sight, ability to move freely or their physical well-being.
5. I will ensure that I am familiar with the breed standard and always try to breed Griffons that are quality specimens that meet the breed standard.
6. I will not deliberately or knowingly breed dogs that are not within the breed standard, including non-recognised colours.
7. I will always aim to breed the best possible dog I can in order to better the breed and maintain the high quality in the breed.


Actions as a Breeder

8. I shall undertake all health testing that I consider necessary (in consultation with my veterinary surgeon) prior to breeding.
9. I shall have all puppies checked thoroughly by a vet prior to sale and I will ensure that they receive all necessary vaccinations.
10. I will not allow any puppy I have bred to go to their new home until they have reached at least 10 weeks of age.
11. I will ensure that any pups I have bred are well-socialised and fed appropriate nutrition so that they are strong, well grown and healthy when they go to their new homes.
12. I shall not breed from a bitch under 18 months of age and I will not breed from a bitch more than twice in 24 months.
13. I shall not permit my dog to be mated to a dog of another breed.

14. I will not sell my dogs to commercial wholesalers, retail pet dealers or puppy farmers who engage in indiscriminate breeding practices.
15. I will not sell any puppy I have bred to people who engage in unethical practices when breeding dogs.
16. I will not get my dogs desexed at an early age. I will recommend that no dog is desexed before 6 months of age and preferably 12 months to give the pup the optimum chance for healthy growth and development
17. I will provide ongoing support for any puppy buyer for the term of the dog's life.
18. I shall represent my breed honestly when discussing health issues without exaggeration.
19. When buying or selling dogs I shall indicate my intentions with honesty and integrity and I will be honest with buyers regarding the dog's health status and veterinary reports.
20. I will not take deposits on puppies from potential buyers until live puppies are born and thriving. In a world where scamming techniques are constantly evolving and becoming more sophisticated, the Club wishes to protect all referred puppy buyers. Breeders who take deposits on puppies prior to the puppy being conceived or born will automatically be removed from being listed as ethical breeders of the club.
21. I will not participate in 'dealing' (i.e. selling dogs bred by other people and passing them off as my own breeding)
22. I will always accept back any dog I have bred, if the owners are unable to keep it, regardless of age.
23. I will ensure that no dog I have bred will end up in the pound.
24. I will work with the club to ensure suitable rehoming of any dogs I have bred.
25. I will at all times act in the best interests of the breed and of the individual dog.



The following information is important

There have not been many litters born to members over the past few months so any members registering need to be aware that they may face a 6 – 12 month wait for a puppy.

If you want a specific coat or gender then you may have a longer wait, depending on the type of pups born. Eg. if you specifically want a rough coat male, you can be sure that Murphy's Law will ensure that the next litter has smooth coat girls etc.

The more flexible you are in your choice the sooner you may get a pup.

Please inform the club if you have registered to get a Griffon but no longer want one. Recently the Registrar has contacted several people only to be told that they have gotten another breed and no longer want a Griffon. It helps us keep our paperwork up to date if we know that you do not require a Griffon any longer.

Breeders Code of Ethics and Conduct

The guidelines are as follows:

- Pre mating testing of prospective parents. Tests to be carried out if validated as a proven scientific screening method and if the evidence indicates that such testing is required in the breed due to scientific validated evidence that indicates a breed concern.
DNA tests to be carried out if available and relevant. (Note: The only DNA tests available for Griffons at the present time are for colour inheritance and parentage. There are **NO** DNA health tests available for Griffons)
- Subject to veterinary advice, no mating where tests indicate inadvisable
- Microchip puppies prior to sale
- Puppy microchip numbers to be included in the Application to Register litter.
- Presale veterinary checks on puppies with written report by veterinary surgeon if required
- Copies of parent's test results and puppy vet check results to be made available to prospective purchasers if requested
- Prospective purchasers can, prior to purchase, view puppies with mother where litter was born and raised. (This will not occur until the pups are vaccinated and protected)
- Provide detailed information on puppy care and welfare to purchasers (All relevant documentation connected with the puppy including *inter alia*, advice on feeding and care, registration documents, (if already issued) details of vaccinations etc are handed over to the purchaser at the time of sale. When an appropriate contract is available it should be signed by both parties. If registration documents are not available at the time of sale the breeder must comply with Dogs NSW Regulations Part 1 – Register and Registration Clauses 13.9 – 13.11)
- To observe proper standards of management in regard to the housing, health, exercising and socialising of all dogs on the premises managed by the registered breeder. (It is strongly recommended that Accredited Breeders follow the guidelines contained in the NSW Animal Welfare Code of Practice "Breeding Dogs and Cats").
- To ensure that all pups are raised in a home environment and are treated as a member of the family. They are not kennelled outside or kept exclusively as kennelled dogs. The mother is also not a kennelled dog but is a member of the household and is treated as such.
- To keep all pups until **10-12 weeks** of age and to ensure that they are socialised prior to leaving.
- To ensure that the breeder is completely honest with the puppy buyer regarding any health issues that may occur
- To ensure that the breeder provides the new owner with detailed information on maintaining the Griffons health and welfare- including information on:
 - the dangers of overexercising in the first 12 months,
 - the dangers of allowing a pup to jump on and off furniture or run up and down stairs,
 - the dangers of early desexing
 - the need for a correct and nutritionally balanced diet to ensure that the pup grows into a strong and healthy adult

Explanation of Terms for Breeders Scheme

Pre mating testing of prospective parents.

Note: Disease testing means:

Testing for health conditions which are notified by the breed club, ANKC or Dogs NSW as relevant to the breed, and for which scientifically validated, reliable, readily available and cost effective screening procedures are available.

DNA tests for hereditary diseases that are available in the relevant breed.

At the present time the most recent comprehensive health survey on the Griffon Bruxellois internationally was carried out by The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW in 2016.

This survey of over 9,000 Griffons identified the most common health issues as;

Slipping Patellas, Cleft Palates and undescended testes.

At the present time there are no DNA tests available for Griffon Bruxellois.

The CGBC of NSW recommends veterinary checks of all breeding dogs prior to breeding. However, we do not recommend the unnecessary use of anaesthetic to test for conditions that are rare or non-existent in the breed or if the dog does not show any symptoms.

The CGBC of NSW believes that all health testing should be done with the welfare and quality of life experienced by the dog as the prime consideration and the terms of the Accreditation: *scientifically validated, reliable, readily available and cost- effective screening procedures are available* should at all times be kept in mind

In reference to the health conditions identified by the Health Survey we have the following comments:

Cleft Palate – The majority of pups born with this condition are euthanised at birth. Some pups are able to be hand reared by breeders. Breeding not supported

Undescended Testes - This is not a life threatening condition and dogs are usually castrated and live normal healthy lives. Breeding not supported.

Patella Luxation- This condition has various grades of severity. A vet can diagnose the condition in a normal physical examination. Further testing/grading available if a condition is identified. Breeding not supported. Pups have loose ligaments that slowly tighten in the first 12 months of life.

Permanent grading cannot be done until the dog is over 12 months.

Anasarca-a condition that commonly affects brachycephalic breeds. While linked to a specific phenotype there is insufficient research to indicate if it is hereditary. If the pup lives, we would expect the breeder to be guided by veterinary advice.

Inguinal/Scrotal Hernia- this can be diagnosed by a normal veterinary examination. It can be a life-threatening condition and can be hereditary. Breeding not supported

(Please note this is not to be confused with an umbilical hernia which is usually not a problem)

SM/CM – The CGBC of NSW supports the research into this condition and supports breeders who have assisted the research by getting their dogs MRI'd. We acknowledge that at the present it is still very much in the research stage. This procedure so far does not meet with any of the definitions for testing at the present time as it is not yet *scientifically validated, reliable, readily available or a cost effective screening procedure(s)*.

MRI's are still a diagnostic process, not a screening process and a permanent grade for a Griffon cannot be issued until the dog is 3.5 years or over.

There are guidelines for breeding published by Claire Rushbridge (UK) which the club recommends members follow as far as is possible but at the present stage it is not essential that members MRI their dogs in order to be accredited as this is still in the research phase.

However, we do recommend that breeders are fully familiar with the genetic lines behind their dogs and take all precautions, including diagnosis, to ensure that they do not breed dogs with this condition.

Other Conditions:

Hips: There is limited evidence that a condition such as H.D is a major issue in the breed in this country.

The club recommends hip X rays with formal, recognized grading if the breeder, after veterinary consultation, feels it is necessary.

The club does not recognize any diagnosis carried out by a vet which is not formally graded under the approved CHEDS grading scheme.

Eyes. We recommend that the eyes are checked during the usual annual veterinary examination. If symptoms of an eye problem are identified by the vet then we recommend a visit to a canine ophthalmologist but do not consider it necessary if the dog does not display symptoms.

BOAS In a limited number of cases we are aware that Griffons have been born with BOAS. We recommend RFG testing and we do not support the breeding from affected animals and members who have done so would not be accredited.

Equally we do not support breeding from Griffons who have required surgery for elongated soft palates or narrowed tracheas if these issues are diagnosed as hereditary.

We support:

- Presale veterinary checks on puppies with written report by veterinary surgeon
- Copies of parents' test results and puppy vet check results to be made available to prospective purchasers
- Puppies are vaccinated and checked by a vet at 6-8 weeks of age.
- Accredited breeders keep the pups until 10-12 weeks when they are again vaccinated and vet checked. These check-ups can be considered as a pre-sale vet check. It is not necessary to have an additional vet check prior to sale.
- The normal veterinary certificate is sufficient if the pup is healthy and free of health problems. However, if the pup is diagnosed with a health problem the CGBC of NSW expects that breeders will fully inform the prospective purchaser prior to sale.
- The CGBC of NSW believes that our member breeders have the love of the breed and the welfare of the breed as their number one priority.

Buyers Rights and Responsibilities

- The majority of breeders do not ask for a deposit. However, if a breeder requires one-NEVER pay a deposit until after the puppies have been born or there is a puppy available or you have visited the litter. Deposits are refundable under Australian Consumer Law unless you change your mind. The dam may not conceive or there might not be enough puppies born. Alternatively, your circumstances might unexpectedly change because of ill health, a work transfer or other unexpected event.
- If you buy a puppy with purchase conditions about future breeding or showing called "breeder's terms", make sure these are spelled out in a written contract, which both breeder and buyer sign and retain respective copies of. Be clear about the conditions and contact The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW if you are concerned or do not quite understand the terminology. This will avoid disagreements later. The breeder should explain every aspect of the agreement.
- You should view the Certificate of Registration and Pedigree for both the dam and sire before paying for the pup. The registration should be ANKC and the pups will be Limited or Main register. See further information - Choosing a Breeder.

If there is a problem - a consumer's right to a remedy

- If you have purchased a pet and something goes wrong, you may have rights against the seller if they failed to meet one or more of the consumer guarantees. Many breeders will sell with a written contract that detail this. Please read carefully and contact The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW if you are unsure
- Generally, you are not entitled to a remedy if you change your mind about a purchase or if the problem is due to something beyond the seller's control. However, if the seller provided an 'express' warranty or an additional promise about the quality, condition, performance or characteristics of the item purchased, they must uphold that guarantee.
- Your entitled remedy will depend on the issue and whether the problem can be classified as major or minor. Effectively, a major problem is when you wouldn't have bought the pet if

you had known the nature and extent of the problem prior to purchase; for example, an animal has a terminal or serious health issue.

In this case, the consumer has the right to choose which remedy the seller will provide. This will either be to:

- have the problem with your pet corrected for example, with veterinary treatment and/or medication;
- return your pet to the seller and have it replaced with another one; or
- return your pet to the seller and have your money refunded.
- When the problem is minor, the seller can choose which remedy they will provide.
- It is recommended that you attempt to negotiate an outcome that both you and the seller can agree to.

If there continues to be a disagreement, Consumer Protection can provide advice and help you resolve the dispute.

(Note: it is the buyer/consumer who has the right to choose which remedy – such as a refund - if there is a problem with the health of a puppy).
