### **Presidents Report**

### (from the 2019 AGM)

Once again, we have had another very successful year for our Club and have achieved many positive things for the club and the breed.

### **Championship Shows**

**We** celebrated our tenth anniversary as a club and also held our 9<sup>th</sup> and 10th Championship shows It was an honour to have two Griffon

specialists as judges. Mrs Jocelyn Croad, who is arguably the doyen of the breed in Australia, with 50 years experience and famous for her Raweke Griffons, and Mrs Sandie Meads from New Zealand, of Paris Griffons, judging her very first Griffon specialty appointment in Australia. We had a strong entry with over 40 Griffons entered. This was a pleasing entry considering that several people and dogs were unable to be entered because of their association with the judges.

The winners were from Qld, the team shown by Ven Grasso and it was good to see the interstate support.

### **Point Score**

The club point score competition was once more a great success with strong Griffon entries at the designated shows, thanks to the enthusiasm and support of our members.

The winner of the 2018-2019 Point Score was Sup Ch Cricklewood Night of Magic in Paris.

Runner Up was Ch Nagpuni in the Midnight Hour, daughter of last year's Runner up Winner of the Puppy point score was Nevaending Dark Fortune.

The point score had over 30 dogs competing in the nominated shows.

The point score was developed to promote the exhibition of quality Griffon Bruxellois and the strength and depth of quality in the breed can be seen in the many and varied dogs who have been so successful in many shows.

### Promoting the breed

### **Dog Lovers Show**

We supported the Dog Lovers Show for the 6<sup>th</sup> year and once more it was highly successful. The club had a double stand which made it easier to accommodate the many people who wanted to see the Griffons. The crowds both days were huge and the Griffons attracted a lot of attention.

We were fortunate to have a lot of support from our members and had over 20 people assisting over the two days. This allowed each person to get a break and we were able to give the Griffons some timeout to have a rest and escape the crowds for a short while. We are very grateful for the whole hearted support we get from our members for events like this.

Our thanks go to Victoria Mercer who organised this and arranged a roster system for members. Many thanks to all the club members who volunteered to support this.

We were, however, not pleased to see that a large scale commercial puppy farm from the Hunter Valley had an enormous stand and was pretending that the Poodle cross dogs that they produce were actually a breed called a Tamaruke. This is a made-up name for a cross breed and was deliberately deceiving the public. We made our objections known to the organisers but if they continue to support puppy farmers then we will reconsider our support

### **Sydney Meet Ups**

Our thanks go to Tom Gregory who organised a series of informal Griffon gatherings during the year for Griffons in Sydney. These were relaxed events which gave Griffon owners the opportunity to meet and chat and allow the Griffons to play and mingle.

### Griffon Buyer Register

The Griffon Buyer Register which was developed in 2014 to assist people in buying a Griffon has gone from strength to strength. Because we are a large club with almost all the quality Griffon breeders in Australia and New Zealand as members, we are in a position to advise people when puppies are available. This has led to an increased membership, we have successfully helped a number of people get a Griffon and we have been able to educate and support members of the public so that they do not choose to get a pup from pet shops or puppy farmers.



In addition, through this register we have several more new show exhibitors who have never shown before and the club members have mentored and supported them in their first few showing experiences.

There were some pups born during 2018-19 but there is still a waiting list. Griffons have always been hard to breed and our members never breed commercially so there have not been many Griffons available

**Rescue** We have fortunately had no dogs in rescue this year but have been concerned about the increasing number of dubious breeders who are entering the breed. There is a growing number of MDBA and unregistered breeders and they are deceiving the public into thinking the dogs are registered. Sadly an increasing number of Griffon crosses are being produced by puppy farmers to meet the growing public demand for the breed. These unscrupulous people only exist because the public supports them by purchasing pups. We continue to help, advise and educate the public to the best of our ability

### **Fund Raising**

Our thanks to Terri Odell who organised the sale of Griffon T Shirts and Polos shirts for owners and Griffon T Shirts for the dogs. These shirts came in a variety of colours and had the logo" As Good as It Gets". Terri organized the design of this logo specifically for our club and has managed the sales of the shirts. They have proven to be popular and a second order has been made. They have been a very useful fundraiser and I know that Terri put in many hours of work in this. These T shirts continue to be popular

### **Maintaining Quality in Griffon Breeding**

All Griffon breeders who are members of our club abide by a strict Code of Ethics.

We work to continue to educate members and potential Griffon buyers about ethical breeding practices and to provide then with advice about identifying unethical and commercial breeders. With the rising popularity of Griffons we have seen an increase in commercial and unethical breeding practices and we work with the other two Griffon clubs in Australia to try to minimise the detrimental impact of these breeders

We also continue to be vigilant in our fight against unethical breeding practices. Our members are very supportive in this and often report inappropriate breeding and advertising of Griffons so that we can take action if they are registered breeders.

We continue to try to educate the public and have been happy to welcome new members who are helping to support us

### Health

Our club continues to support health research for Griffons. We ensure that members are kept fully informed about the latest health research findings and problems and support proven, reputable research.

### Membership

Our membership has grown rapidly over the past year and at the moment we have just under 200 members who are all Griffon owners or Griffon lovers. We ensure that we meet the needs of all members, exhibitors and pet owners alike.

We have been happy to welcome 5 new exhibitors into the ring with their Griffons and the club mentors and assists these people.

New exhibitors are the life blood of the breed and we need to keep encouraging them if the breed is to continue and not stagnate



We have a strict code of conduct for all members which includes the way members treat dogs and the way they behave and communicate with other members. We expect all members to comply with this.

### Newsletter

The club produces a newsletter 'The Phoenix" which is issued quarterly and is full of information from Australia and overseas with items of interest for both show and pet owners.



### Important Notice to All Pet Owners!

The Australian Veterinary Association has issued a warning to vet clinics and pet owners alike advising that they are documenting at least one case a week of Fanconi-like syndrome, associated with the feeding of commercial dried treats originating from Asia.

The toxin causing this disease has yet to be identified. Fanconi-like disease affects the kidneys. Dogs may exhibit clinical signs including increased thirst, increased urination, vomiting and loss of appetite. In addition, they may show an elevation in some of their liver enzymes and lower than normal phosphate levels. However, the hallmark of this syndrome is glucose in their urine, but no elevated glucose levels in their blood.

Whilst many cases recover simply by withdrawing the treats, some cases have been associated with severe kidney failure and death.

If you are at all concerned about your pets, please contact your local Vet Clinic. They can run a urine test to screen for the syndrome and perform further diagnostics if needed.

We strongly urge you all to please check the country of origin of any treats that you feed your pets. Please use treats made in Australia from 100% Australian produce or homemade ones. If you cannot identify the country of origin, we advise erring on the side of caution and discarding those treats. - Story Credit: Kanwal Veterinary Hospital (02) 4392 2088

Most of the treats at supermarkets are dubious. Please read the label carefully for country of origin. It is worth paying a bit more for the health of your dogs.

### Griffons no longer able to fly on Qantas or Virgin airlines in Australia

Dear Valued Customer,

At Virgin Australia, we take pride in the safe transportation of pets around our network and we ensure that the highest standard of care is undertaken when pets are travelling on board with us.

In recent times, we have seen a tragic spike in issues across the industry when transporting snub-nosed breeds, and this has prompted Virgin Australia to review the transport of these animals.

Whilst we understand that snub-nosed breeds are a popular choice of pet, they are a highrisk animal to transport due to their known respiratory issues and other health problems that may be compounded inflight.

With comprehensive analysis being undertaken and working with associations such as the RSPCA, Virgin Australia has made the difficult decision to no longer accept bookings for snub-nosed breeds until further notice. We will not accept bookings for these breeds from 24 January 2020.



The club hopes to reschedule another Griffon get together in lieu of the Christmas party when the weather has cooled down in 2020.



### Fire Evacuation- Jane and Wolf Wistuba's Ordeal

While the majority of members were safe and only had to worry about the never ending smoke haze, some had to do it tougher.

Jane Wistuba and her husband Wolf with their grand daughter





Jane Wistuba and her husband Wolf, had to evacuate from their Hilltop home twice when the giant Green Wattle fires threatened them.

They were directed by the RFS to go to Mittagong as all other roads out of the area were closed due to the fires.



They were trapped in Mittagong along with many others, in searing heat with strong hot, gusting westerly winds that were feeding the fires and creating appalling heat.

The evacuation point at Mittagong RSL was full when they arrived with the van and a car and trailer



carrying their dogs, cat and birds, plus the few essential possessions they had time to collect. After reporting, they were issued with wristbands and sought urgent shelter. Due to the conditions and the huge number of evacuees they were forced to go to the car park under the shopping centre in order to get some shade on the 44 degree day. Even there it was still 38 degrees with little relief. To

complicate the situation even more, Jane had a litter of two, pups and their mother, Jemima. At only two weeks of age they were all feeling the heat in the traumatic conditions. Jane had cool coats for Jemima and the oldies but the challenge was to keep the pups comfortable so that they did not overheat.



Communications were difficult due to the fires and Jane was trying to save her

phone battery as she had no way to charge it

Five hours after evacuating, the winds changed to a southerly direction, bringing cooler air and much needed relief to everyone. Finally, the pups started to feed again much to Jane's relief. Eventually, at 1 am, after over twelve hours, they were told that they were able to return home and were relieved to see that their house although covered in ash, was still standing. Even though they had left

sprinklers on the roof and around the perimeter, they didn't know what to expect as the fire had been so ferocious and they have natural bush across the road from their home Once home they had several sleepless hours getting the

animals settled and checking on the chickens that they had not been able to take

The dogs were all fine, although slightly bewildered and both Jemima and the puppies had a good feed.

They were exhausted but had to be ready to evacuate again if the winds changed the direction of the fire.

Jane and Wolf lived in this situation for a month with their cars packed and ready to evacuate if ordered.

They were forced to evacuate once more and again the house survived thanks to the amazing people of the RFS.

Jane was able to send a message to everyone





"A huge thankyou to everyone that called and messaged me over the past week checking in on us due to the fires For all the offers of accommodation or for offering to take the dogs. We were evacuated twice, but now we are back home for now, fingers crossed, but can't say we are out of the woods yet.

It has been overwhelming support from family, friends and people we don't even know.

A big thankyou to <u>Rach Beanie</u>, Daniel and Jess for your kindness, help and keeping me from almost losing it. We can't name you all, but you all know who you are, love you guys.

Most of all to <u>Blake Wistuba</u>, <u>Rebecca</u>

<u>Wistuba</u> and <u>Adele Wistuba</u> for your constant calls to convince us to get out and for taking us in the first evacuation. Unfortunately, they closed all the roads so we couldn't get to them on the weekend, when you had

your own problems going on, we love you more than you know.

Lastly, the fireies, volunteers for tirelessly working so hard day and night fighting a huge fight, Thank you."

Jane and Wolf had a traumatic experience and still managed to come out smiling. Because they were sensible enough to have a fire evacuation plan in place they were able to escape safely. I am sure they will agree when I say that I hope they never have to go though such trauma again. And today as I write the following post has been published announcing that this fire is finally contained

# **Conformational risks of BOAS in dogs**

From the Cambridge University BOAS Research page

Our research has found that certain external traits are associated with an increased risk of BOAS in



Pugs, French bulldogs, and Bulldogs. In general, dogs with open nostrils, less brachycephalic dogs (narrower and longer head), and those with thinner necks (lower ratio of neck girth to chest girth) are less likely to develop BOAS. Although these generalisations are helpful, unfortunately they do not apply to every

dog. To be sure your dog is not affected by BOAS we recommend annual BOAS assessments for these three breeds.

At the present time, BOAS is not a problem with Griffons and responsible breeders will do all they can to ensure that dogs they breed have large wide open nostrils and free breathing. However this chart has valuable advice to keep the dogs healthy

### What happens in a BOAS assessment?

From the Cambridge University BOAS Research Group

A BOAS assessment uses non-invasive respiratory function tests to determine whether a brachycephalic patient is affected by airway obstruction. Clinical signs of BOAS may be intermittent, for example only present during exercise, excitement or sleep, and therefore reliable assessment of airway obstruction may not be achieved by one-off clinical examination of a patient at rest. At the QVSH we use a combination of clinical history (checklist) and a 3-minute exercise test - <video in the comment section of this post> (assuming we feel it is safe to do so) to functionally grade each dog, as follows:

Grade 0 – BOAS free; annual health check is suggested if the dog is under 2 years old. Grade I – clinically unaffected but with mild respiratory signs, annual health check is suggested if the dog is under 3 years old.

Grade II – clinically affected with moderate respiratory signs. The dog has a clinically relevant disease and requires management, including weight loss and/or surgical intervention.

Grade III –clinically affected with severe respiratory signs. The dog should have a thorough veterinary examination with surgical intervention.

We also use whole-body barometric plethysmography (WBBP) to objectively measure respiratory function in brachycephalic dogs. This test involves placing the dog inside a transparent chamber with a constant ventilating airflow. The chamber monitors the pressure changes that occur as a result of the dog breathing in and out. A number of respiratory parameters are measured for analysis, allowing a BOAS index (0-100%) to be calculated. The higher the BOAS index, the more severe the respiratory obstruction. Dogs do not receive any sedatives or general anaesthesia for this test, which usually takes about 30 minutes. An investigator is present throughout and the test is terminated if the dog does not tolerate being in the WBBP chamber. So far over 1800 brachycephalic dogs have been tested and the tolerance rate is approximately 85%.

At the moment there is only one barometric chamber in Australia and that was funded by The French Bulldogs Club of NSW.

# Don't be fooled- Only buy Correct Colours

This poster has been produced by the English Kennel Club but it is still very relevant to Griffons. As a breed increases in popularity, as Griffons are doing, unscrupulous people will resort to any length to fool buyers.

Recently in WA a young girl bought a white puppy with tan patches and was told that it was a Griffon or possibly a Griffon/Schnauzer cross. She had visited the home and met the breeder and thought that she had done the right thing as a responsible buyer. Sadly, she had been totally fooled.

# Before deciding to buy a puppy with unusual colouring, there are some things you need to know first.



### Are they really rare?

No, a breeder may say these colours are rare, but this just means that the people who developed the breed preferred other colours. The term 'rare' is simply a tactic to make these breeds seem more special than others.

### How much should they cost?

Your puppy shouldn't cost any more than other dogs in the breed. Unusual coloured dogs can be seen as fashionable, so just make sure the breeder cares about the puppy's health and future, and not just your money.

### The breeder

Puppies should always be bought from a responsible breeder who registers with the Kennel Club and does everything they can to make sure that the dogs they breed are happy and healthy, such as a Kennel Club Assured Breeder. You need to visit the puppy at home and meet their mum, just as you would with any other puppy.

### Your puppy's health & happiness

Your puppy's mum and dad should be health screened for the same conditions as the other mums and dads in the breed. Their health and temperament should always be more important than their colour.



Be sure to do your research before you buy a puppy. To find out more about a breed or about unusual colours, speak to your local breed club or visit **breedinformationcentre.org.uk**

Usually when people offer "rare" colours it means that the dog is a cross breed of some type because many breeds only carry a particular genetic colour combination for the breed. Only buy from registered ANKC breeders and if in doubt ask the club for advice. We are here to help so that you will not be ripped off by dishonest and unethical breeders

Griffons only come in red, black, black and tan or a colour we call Belge which is a muddy reddish brown. Even if it had been a schnauzer cross it would not have been white with tan patches as neither breed carries the gene for markings of this type.

This puppy is probably a perfectly sweet little puppy but when the buyer is paying top price for a dog that they believe to be a Griffon then they are entitled to get a Griffon.

In the case of this particular pup, the markings indicated that it probably had some type of terrier crossed with it and may have had no Griffon at all. So not only did she pay for a Griffon that she didn't get she also got a dog that will grow to have a totally different personality and

### **Breeders Standards**

The guidelines are as follows:

- Pre mating testing of prospective parents. Tests to be carried out if validated as a proven scientific screening method and if the evidence indicates that such testing is required in the breed due to scientific validated evidence that indicates a breed concern.
   DNA tests to be carried out if available and relevant.
- Subject to veterinary advice, no mating where tests indicate inadvisable
- Microchip puppies prior to sale
- Puppy microchip numbers to be included in the Application to Register litter.
- Presale veterinary checks on puppies with written report by veterinary surgeon if required
- Copies of parent's test results and puppy vet check results to be made available to prospective purchasers if requested
- Prospective purchasers can, prior to purchase, view puppies with mother where litter was born and raised. (This will not occur until the pups are vaccinated and protected)
- Provide detailed information on puppy care and welfare to purchasers (All relevant documentation connected with the puppy including inter alia, advice on feeding and care, registration documents, (if already issued) details of vaccinations etc are handed over to the purchaser at the time of sale. When an appropriate contract is available it should be signed by both parties. If registration documents are not available at the time of sale the breeder must comply with Dogs NSW Regulations Part 1 Register and Registration Clauses 13.9 13.11)
- To observe proper standards of management in regard to the housing, health, exercising and socialising of all dogs on the premises managed by the registered breeder. (It is strongly recommended that Accredited Breeders follow the guidelines contained in the NSW Animal Welfare Code of Practice "Breeding Dogs and Cats").
- To ensure that all pups are raised in a home environment and are treated as a member of the family. They are not kennelled outside or kept exclusively as kennelled dogs. The mother is also not a kennelled dog but is a member of the household and is treated as such.
- To keep all pups until 10-12 weeks of age and to ensure that they are socialised prior to leaving.
- To ensure that the breeder is completely honest with the puppy buyer regarding any health issues that may occur
- To ensure that the breeder provides the new owner with detailed information on maintaining the Griffons health and welfare- including information on:
  - the dangers of overexercising in the first 12 months,
  - the dangers of allowing a pup to jump on and off furniture or run up and down stairs,
  - the dangers of early desexing
  - the need for a correct and nutritionally balanced diet to ensure that the pup grows into a strong and healthy adult



# **Explanation of Terms for Breeders Scheme**

Pre mating testing of prospective parents.

Note: Disease testing means:

Testing for health conditions which are notified by the breed club, ANKC or Dogs NSW as relevant to the breed, and for which scientifically validated, reliable, readily available and cost effective screening procedures are available.

DNA tests for hereditary diseases that are available in the relevant breed.

At the present time the most recent comprehensive health survey on the Griffon Bruxellois internationally was carried out by The Country Griffon Bruxellois Club of NSW in 2016. This survey of over 9,000 Griffons identified the most common health issues as;

Slipping Patellas, Cleft Palates and undescended testes.

At the present time there are no DNA tests available for Griffon Bruxellois.

The CGBC of NSW recommends veterinary checks of all breeding dogs prior to breeding. However we do not recommend the unnecessary use of anaesthetic to test for conditions that are rare or non existent in the breed or if the dog does not show any symptoms.

The CGBC of NSW believes that all health testing should be done with the welfare and quality of life experienced by the dog as the prime consideration and the terms of the Accreditation: scientifically validated, reliable, readily available and cost effective screening procedures are available should at all times be kept in mind

In reference to the health conditions identified by the Health Survey we have the following comments:

Cleft Palate – The majority of pups born with this condition are euthanised at birth. Some pups are able to be hand reared by breeders. Breeding not supported

Undescended Testes- This is not a life threatening condition and dogs are usually castrated and live normal healthy lives. Breeding not supported.

Patella Luxation- This condition has various grades of severity. A vet can diagnose the condition in a normal physical examination. Further testing/grading available if a condition is identified. Breeding not supported

Anasarca-a condition that commonly affects brachycephalic breeds. While linked to a specific phenotype there is insufficient research to indicate if it is hereditary. If the pup survives we would expect the breeder to be guided by veterinary advice.

Inguinal/Scrotal Hernia- this can be diagnosed by a normal veterinary examination. It can be a life-threatening condition and can be hereditary. Breeding not supported

(Please note this is not to be confused with an umbilical hernia which is usually not a problem)

SM/CM – The CGBC of NSW supports the research into this condition and supports breeders who have assisted the research by getting their dogs MRI'd. We acknowledge that at the present it is still very much in the research stage. This procedure so far does not meet with any of the definitions for testing at the present time as it is not yet scientifically validated, reliable, readily available or a cost effective screening procedure(s).

MRI's are still a diagnostic process, not a screening process and a permanent grade for a Griffon can not be issued until the dog is 3.5 years or over.

There are guidelines for breeding published by Claire Rushbridge (UK) which the club recommends members follow as far as is possible but at the present stage it is not essential that members MRI their dogs in order to be accredited as this is still in the research phase.

Other Conditions: There is limited evidence that conditions such as H.D are an issue in the breed in this country. The club recommends hip Xrays and formal, recognized grading if the breeder, after veterinary consultation, feels it is necessary.

The club does not recognize any diagnosis carried out by a vet which is not formally graded under the approved CHEDS grading scheme.

Eyes. We recommend that the eyes are checked during the usual annual veterinary examination. If symptoms of an eye problem are identified by the vet then we recommend a visit to a canine ophthalmologist but do not consider it necessary if the dog does not display symptoms.

Stenotic Nares. In a limited number of cases we are aware that Griffons have been born with Stenotic Nares. Whilst it is possible that these dogs can have the nostrils enlarged to enable them to breath we do not support the breeding from affected animals and members who have done so would not be accredited.

Equally we do not support breeding from Griffons who have required surgery for elongated soft palates or narrowed tracheas if these issues are diagnosed as hereditary.

Presale veterinary checks on puppies with written report by veterinary surgeon Copies of parents test results and puppy vet check results to be made available to prospective purchasers

Puppies are vaccinated and checked by a vet at 6-8 weeks of age.

Accredited breeders keep the pups until 10-12 weeks when they are again vaccinated and vet checked. These check ups can be considered as a pre sale vet check. It is not necessary to have an additional vet check prior to sale .

The normal veterinary certificate is sufficient if the pup is healthy and free of health problems. However, if the pup is diagnosed with a health problem the CGBC of NSW expects that breeders will fully inform the prospective purchaser prior to sale.

The CGBC of NSW believes that our member breeders have the love of the breed and the welfare of the breed as their number one priority.
